Our local fire heroes at Ballarat Fire Brigade

Two Brown Hill families are dedicated to volunteering with the Ballarat Fire Brigade. Both have fathers and sons on the team.

On Saturday, 3 August, at the Ballarat Fire Brigade's Presentation Night, Brown Hill local Trent Zuidland received his 15-year CFA service medal and a National Medal for 15 years diligent service to the CFA.

Trent says, "I was very proud to receive the awards. CFA has taken me across the state and I have had lots of great experiences over my 15 years of service."

Many Brown Hill locals will recognise Trent and his family as regulars at the Brown Hill Pool. In fact, they volunteered over the last two summers to run the Kiosk at the Pool, for which many of us were very grateful!

When he is not in training to

become the Pool Pump Operator at the Brown Hill Pool, Trent's eldest son, Ben, is practising moving water around with intricate systems of pipes and hoses. Earlier this year, Ben joined the Junior Brigade. Ben says, "I enjoy the activities and squirting water from the truck."

Another Brown Hill local, Andrew Day, was recognised in 2018 for 30 years of service to the CFA.

Andrew joined the Ballarat Fire Brigade in 1988 as a volunteer and is now a Life Member. He is also a member of the Rescue Unit and has held various leadership roles over the years, including Lieutenant and Communications Officer.

Andrew became a staff member of the CFA in 2000, getting involved in practical training. Throughout, he has continued his volunteer service. He says, "I enjoy serving the community."

One of Andrew's sons, Jordan, is in Grade Six at Caledonian Primary School and last year also joined the Ballarat Fire Brigade. He had been waiting patiently to be old enough to become a junior member. Through the training, Jordan has achieved his first aid qualification. He says, "I enjoy meeting new people and I enjoy the things we learn during our training nights. I look up to my dad and my brother Nick."

Andrew's older son, Nick, was also a member of the Junior Brigade years ago. The CFA started Nick's career path as he now works as a Project Fire Fighter with Forest Fire Management at the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning.

Our Local Area Plan

Program review will benefit Brown Hill Local Area Plan

"In 2028, the Brown Hill
Community will continue to be
close-knit and proud of the area in
which they live. Moderate growth
will be accommodated and the
public realm will be improved but
the intrinsic qualities of Brown Hill
such as the feeling of space, the
country atmosphere and bushland
backdrop will be ever-present and
protected."

This broad community vision is helping to shape Brown Hill's future. Through extensive consultation following the Draft Scenarios Paper released earlier this year, a number of key themes are emerging which will inform the Local Area Plan.

These include:

Appropriate development: new development to integrate with landform and existing vegetation and reflect the partially rural character in "Emerging Brown Hill" and respect the existing heritage character in "Established Brown Hill".

Memorable and functional streets: a more interconnected

...continued from p.3 road network with improved safety for pedestrians, cyclists and drivers.

Quality open space and public realm: ensuring a network of trails to connect Brown Hill's natural and recreational assets to the neighbourhoods.

Country town character and rural setting: protecting treelines and bushland backdrops and respecting historical development, patterns and features.

Natural environment and heritage: identifying key areas for vegetation protection and habitat restoration while ensuring bushfire management is fully addressed.

Planning for growth: making sure infrastructure needs are understood and provided for in key areas.

Across the Ballarat municipality, community members and Councillors have recently raised concerns about how landscape and neighbourhood character is managed as the city grows, particularly in the Geelong Road corridor, Mount Helen and other areas experiencing significant growth.

As a result, the strategic planning program has been reviewed and new projects added to the program to ensure character management objectives can be achieved. This program of work, which will be of great benefit to the Brown Hill Local Area Plan includes:

1. Neighbourhood character study - identifying character across the city and how it should be protected

2. Compact City Housing Plan - identifying priority growth areas, limited growth areas (including capacity, location and character) and how growth will be managed

3. Living Corridor Protection
Review – including a planning
scheme controls review relating to
vegetation and environmental
significance, including the koala
overlay and how these relate to
bushfire overlay controls

These projects will provide extremely useful information to guide character and environmental values management as the city grows.

The findings will also be incorporated into other projects that are underway and progressed through a planning scheme amendment to introduce new controls.

Due to the benefit of having this additional work undertaken first, a decision has been made to delay the Brown Hill Local Area Plan's completion until this new program of works has been finalised.

It is expected the draft Brown Hill Local Area Plan will now be released for consultation in mid-2020.

Kindergarten in 2020

Place offers for 2020 kindergarten were sent out in early August. Please make sure you have enrolled your child for 2020 so you don't miss out on a place. This is done through the City of Ballarat. Children currently attending the pre-kinder group also need to be enrolled for pre-school next year. Make sure you have ticked the four-year-old box on your council enrolment form!

Please also remember that children can be enrolled in the year they turn two. Places are allocated based on date of enrolment so the earlier you enrol the more likely you are to get an offer at the kindergarten of your choice. Please pass this information on to others with young children.

Kindergarten for all threeyear-old children

Victoria will be the first state or territory in Australia to introduce a subsidised kindergarten program for all three-year-olds. Subsidised kindergarten means the government will help the kindergarten service with the cost of your child attending. This helps keep your fees low.

Subsidised kindergarten for threeyear-olds will become available in stages, Ballarat starting in 2022. That year, all three-year-olds Bronze sponsor:

across the state will have access to at least five hours in a qualified kindergarten program led by a teacher. The hours will then increase up to the full 15-hour program by 2029.

Recycle your bottle caps

Did you know that bottle caps are fully recyclable? Unfortunately, as reported on ABC's 'War on Waste', they aren't being recycled.

So the kindergarten is collecting bottle caps for the worldwide community to recycle into 3D printed bespoke aids. They will then be donated to children in need in under-serviced countries.

We have a box in the foyer and can accept caps with a "2" or "4" printed on them - sometimes in the little triangle, but often not.



From the Principal's desk

Whilst we may all fall guilty of having the 'Winter Blues', at Woodmans Hill we are very much aware that Spring is around the corner and we are entering a season associated with new life and growth. A sense of expectancy seems to be present within our college and this can be most clearly felt within our more senior students.

For Year 11 and 12 students, we are very much at the 'business end' of the year when they realise that every second of every minute counts. For our VCAL students. they are hard at work developing employability skills that will give them an advantage over their peers across Ballarat. It gives me enormous pleasure to go into our VCAL classes and hear the ideas that they have to change their immediate and wider community. When I hear our students' plans to support the most vulnerable members of our society and then see them work hard to follow through on these projects, I am filled with pride in what they have achieved and will go on to achieve. Two students, Jasmine and Rhiannon fundraised for the WRISC Family Violence Support organisation. This is just one example of how our students care for others. I believe our students will go on to make a massive difference within our society as they come from a position of good values, a belief in social justice and a willingness to look after others. In supporting a wide range of

causes, our VCAL students are developing the skills that are transferable and critical in the world of work. They continue to act as ambassadors and role models to our younger students whilst learning to grow and learn.

At the same time, many of our VCE students are in the process of applying for university places. Through the work of the senior team, they have been given the opportunity to meet with representatives from some of the top universities to get a sense of the range of opportunities that are available. I have been impressed by our students' ambition and their commitment to finding ways to visit as many university open days as possible to choose their right destination. As someone who has taught in the private sector, I know 100% that our students are more than a match for their peers across the state and have the same entitlement to pursue the highest qualifications that can open doors for them in the future.

Our students have received ongoing support from 'Elevate' (who specialise in providing study skills seminars across Australia) and targeted assemblies from our own staff. Our current crop of senior students are assessment-ready. We wish them well in the final stage of their journey with us.

As a community who believe that the sky's the limit for our students we need to continue to work together to help realise every dream.

Recently the City of Ballarat spent six months, from June to
December 2018, in a consultation process to develop the 'Good Food for All 2019-2022 Strategy'. The Council want to positively influence the Ballarat food environment.

At the Ballarat Wholefoods Collective (BWC) we think we have got this sorted already.

The draft 'Good Food for All 2019-22 Strategy' has three main priorities which include:

- 1. Increasing access to and promotion of safe and nutritious food through greater consumption of healthy food and drinks, improving community knowledge and skills to grow and prepare healthy meals and supporting community food system programs.
- 2. Supporting a sustainable local food system through reducing food and packaging waste and supporting local food production and sales.
- 3. Celebrating a vibrant, inclusive food culture which supports and promotes local producers.

We believe the issues outlined as problems for the Ballarat community in accessing and consuming good food are largely addressed through shopping at the BWC.

The BWC encourages and enables people:

- * to eat unprocessed, nutritional food, not ready made food.
- * to be curious about where food comes from, who grows it and how it can be accessed locally.
- * to connect with other likeminded people in an interactive shopping space which can reduce people's sense of isolation from others, improving community mental and physical health.
- * to shop sustainably but

affordably: buying organic products in bulk reduces the cost for everyone, providing greater accessibility.

- * to be responsible for the packaging their food comes in. Most products at the BWC require the shopper to bring their own containers thus providing a way to shop that does not contribute to the burgeoning waste problem for the world.
- * to shop locally from local producers thus reducing the food miles the products travel.

All are welcome to join the BWC. There is an initial membership fee of \$50 and an annual renewal fee of \$20. Come along and check out the products on offer at the Barkly Street Hub, opposite the old Fire Station in Barkly Street, Ballarat East.

From 3 September, the new BWC opening hours are: 9.00 am to 11.00 am Tuesdays 5.00 pm to 7.00 pm Tuesdays 9.00 am to 11.00 am Wednesdays (school term time only, closed during the school holidays).

Do you own a pool or spa?

Have your say on proposed new laws around private pools and spas.

The Building Amendment (Swimming Pool and Spa)
Regulations 2019 will introduce mandatory requirements for owners of private swimming pools or spas to register their pool or spa with their local council.

Under the changes, owners will also need to engage a registered building surveyor or building inspector to inspect and certify the compliance of their safety barrier every three years.

The regulations aim to reduce the number of young children drowning in private swimming pools and spas by improving compliance with safety barrier requirements and are expected to start on 1 December 2019.

Private swimming pool and spa owners are required to take necessary action by 14 April 2020.

How much? Up to \$20,000 across four rounds (dependent on funding availability).

Who can apply? Local, not-forprofit organisations which have their own bank account, ABN, are incorporated or have an auspicing organisation.

The City of Ballarat Mayor Cr Samantha McIntosh says, "The Community Impact Grants program is a great opportunity for not-for-profit community groups to apply for funding for a range of projects or equipment upgrades."

"We've been able to supply groups with funding to purchase remote video-conferencing equipment, provide training and purchase uniforms and an automated external defibrillator."

The City of Ballarat recently adopted changes to the Program, making it easier to apply. There is a new streamlined application form for requests of under \$2,000, excluding GST.

Other changes include:

- 1. Raising the maximum grant allocation from \$10,000 to \$20,000, excluding GST, where applicants include a cash contribution based on a 2:1 match ratio for all requests over \$10,000. This change is designed to broaden the potential scope and impact of the program.
- 2. Accepting funding requests for minor capital projects to upgrade infrastructure at venues not owned by the City of Ballarat or the Victorian Government. This will support minor capital projects where accessibility and sustainability improvements can be implemented at community venues.
- 3. Accepting partnership applications between local community organisations and schools that demonstrate broad community benefit. This is designed to boost the number of children's and youth-based applications.

Beyond the Plastic Bag

Brown Hill local, Liz Mason, attended the 'Beyond the Plastic Bag' seminar at Federation University Business School on 9 July 2019. A legal ban on lightweight single use plastic bags will come into effect in Victoria on 1 November 2019. Liz took the time to share what she learnt with the Brown Hill community.

In opening, the Dean of Federation University Business School, Professor Lim, reported that researchers have been looking at consumption and production practices and decided to share their findings with the general public.

A Global View

Dr Vicki Little, a marketing researcher from Monash University in Malaysia, described how Malaysia tried to develop plastic bag policies due to waste being washed down into the rivers as the result of tsunamis. They looked at the global incidence, its effects and what they tell us about the way the world works. A plastic bag tax failed in Malaysia. Charges for plastic bags were rejected by consumers which they saw as an annoyance and subversive. Everyone switched to shopping on Saturdays when it was made a

"free bag day", which resulted in unhappy retailers. Consumers felt that litterers were responsible for the problem, not the bag itself.

Thinking Outside the Bag

La Vergne Lehmann, Executive
Officer of the Grampians Central
West Waste and Resource
Recovery Group, spoke about
plastic wrapping as a major waste.
Soft plastics are recyclable but
not in your kerbside recycling
bin, only through the Redcycle
bins in Coles and Woolworths.

The average plastic bag is used for 12 minutes and takes up to 1000 years to break down, even though it is a modern convenience. She said that shopping habits changed in the early 1980s and plastic waste became a manufacturers, market and consumer problem.

Ms Lehmann spoke about 'Boomerang Bags', which is a global movement where volunteers make cloth bags for people to share. There are many social media groups focusing on recycling issues which is creating a social movement. People have started to take bags with them to the shops/market and changing our ways like this affects retailers. With consumer awareness increasing, reusable bags are now for sale. Some retailers still offer used cardboard boxes. South Australia will soon ban plastic cutlery, straws and stirrers.

What's Happening in Ballarat?

Councillor Belinda Coates from the City of Ballarat gave a local perspective. She said there has been a significant shift around environmental and economic issues in political spheres. The City of Ballarat supported the Victorian State Government to ban single use plastic bags in October 2017.

The City of Ballarat has strategic waste management actions. Cr Coates said that community education minimises waste and encourages avoiding single use plastic bags. Promotion by the City of Ballarat has included reuseable wallet bags being handed out at events and school visits.

There is an A-Z waste guide on the City of Ballarat's website: www.ballarat.vic.gov.au and the 'My Ballarat' magazine (delivered to 40,000 households) recently had an article titled, 'Putting a Stop to Plastic Pollution'. This article was highlighted in the ABC's show 'War on Waste'.

The City of Ballarat also conducts kerbside audits which show a high level of contamination in recyclables, especially when they are bagged (they should be loose). Sometimes bagged garbage is put in recycle bins.

Also, not everything that is recyclable can go in the kerbside recycle bin. For example, E-waste (anything with an electrical plug), globes etc. However, paper, cardboard, glass jars and clean pizza boxes (no food) are OK.

How the Ban Affects Retailers

Emma Jennings from the National Retail Assocation spoke on behalf of retailers, saying a volume of one billion plastic bags are used per year with 10 million being discarded as rubbish. The effect of this includes damage to the food chain. I was horrified to hear that, on average, we each consume a credit card amount of microplastic per week.

Some reusable plastic bags do not comply with standards. There can be a \$9,700 fine for an individual retailer and \$48,000 for a corporation. They can be audited by the EPA (Environment Protection Authority) or the NRA (National Retailers Association).

Five steps for business:

- 1. Find alternatives to plastic bags.
- 2. Charge bag fees.
- 3. Phase out existing stock.
- 4. Train the team.
- 5. Inform customers.

Retailers are encouraged to use stock up by **31 October 2019** (or recycle via Redcycle bins).

Charity food stalls and Op. Shops cannot accept used plastic bags.

- 6 steps for businesses to going plastic free:
- Place signage near the counter explaining the change and reminding customers to bring their own bags (posters are available).
- 2. Always ask customers whether they need a bag before giving them one.
- Provide a reusable bag for sale and encourage your customers to use them.
- 4. Replace plastic bags with paper or accepted reusable bags. Have used cardboard boxes easily available to your customers.
- 5. Consider introducing a fee for the paper or accepted reusable bags to encourage customers to bring their own bag or introducing an incentive for bringing their own.

Take the next step and look at replacing any other disposable plastic items used in your business.

Proposed Brown Hill parkrun



Waking Near the Yarrowee

In the quiet of early morning, birds are speaking the language of water.

It can hardly be said that I live by the river: it passes almost as close behind my house as the road does in front, but a few more houses stand in-between, keeping a wedge of suburbia between me and its slender, dam-enfeebled, ancient flow,

though if I'd woken here just a few lifetimes ago, all of this land our blocks have been carved from would have been the river's: the unfenced ground gently sloping and softening to its banks, polished here and there to the sky's brightness, and the trees reverently shrouding its pure, supple nakedness.

Carried half a world by a tide of migration from the Humber's banks of gleaming mud and deposited on the dazzling sands of the deep blue Swan, then tumbled across this continent by the currents modernity told me it was proper to abandon myself to, my head rests on the pillow here now, by the Yarrowee, like a river-stone through which the water-birds' carolling resonates as their praise, and as my longing for the river-world back.
