



BROWN HILL POST OFFICE

The first Brown Hill Post Office was in a Store owned by Thomas Ryan. The store was situated in Humffray Street North, prior to 1853, and by 1857 he had added the Brown Hill Hotel next door. The Postal Services at Brown Hill were to start in December 1857 but the Courier advised people to start addressing their mail to the Brown Hill Post Office in their article on November 17, 1857 to make sure their letters were not delayed. (This Store and Hotel are shown on the 1861 Map.) The Post Office at Mount Pleasant was the next to be established and was planned to open on the 1st January 1858 at Mr. William Prest's Mount Pleasant Hotel.

So Thomas Ryan was the first Postmaster in December 1857 and was granted the pay of Twenty Pounds per annum. The next Postmaster was Francis Bradbury in 1866 with the pay rate being increased to Thirty Pounds per annum. Then the Post Office was in charge with G.Schmidt, Patrick O'Day, William O'Day, Honora O'Day and Honora McMahon. These people were all the publicans of the Brown Hill Hotel, so we can assume that the Brown Hill Post Office was still at the Brown Hill Hotel & Store in Humffray Street until 1903. After Mrs.McMahon the Postmistress was Mrs.Murray with the Post Office being situated at its present site.

In the 1882 Directory the Post Office has is listed in the following order:

Brown Hill Hotel Brown Hill Post Office Picnic Grounds Apollo Hall

In other references the Apollo Hall was apparently situated next to the Brown Hill Hotel and used as a Hall for the Hotel, so this would then mean the Post Office is still situated at Thomas Ryan's Brown Hill Store that the Post Office originally started in.



If this Directory were an accurate account of the shops, this would mean although the Post Office Records have the O'Day's as Postmaster during the late 1880's to 1901 the Post office has shifted to 407 Humffray Street North, and that Mrs.Murray is in charge.


George Skinner followed Miss Murray's Store and Post Office, then Mr.Morris. In 1919 George Stewart was the proud owner and by 1921 the Post Office had withdrawn the telephone facilities. This store/grocery shop/post office was burnt down and rebuilt by George Stewart in 1928. Where the present Shell Service Station is was a building that George Stewart used for storing fodder, etc. Miss Jean Stewart than conducted the business with her Uncle Mr.A.Hehir.

The fire at the Brown Hill Post Office and Store was reported as occurring on a Saturday night and destroyed a large stock plus the wooden building in which the business was located. Mr.Stewart, who lived in a cottage on the east side of the shop, had been attending the pictures in town. The Fire Brigade was called out at 9p.m. and also by the street alarm at 8.47p.m. Capt Clymo attended, but the chance of saving anything was practically impossible with so much inflammable material stored in the shop, a truck of kerosene having been delivered the day previous, and a very low water pressure, made the task of the Fire Brigade a very difficult one. The kerosene tins kept exploding, which apparently lite the sky like fireworks, attracted a huge number of people to witness this blazing fire. Mr.Turner's Butcher Shop was continually sprayed with water, to prevent this establishment catching fire also. Over Two Thousand Pounds of stock were lost, the books of the business were all destroyed and the Insurance was not high enough to cover all these loses. The business will be carried out in the adjoining residence temporarily.

The present Brown Hill Post Office is still incorporated in the Brown Hill Store, but this has been extensively renovated inside and although it still maintains its original appearance outside, it is a modern shop inside. The shop has also been extended, so that the Post Office part of the business, (which was a bench and pigeon holes on the wall for the mail and the old scales at the back of the store), now have a frontage of their own in Humffray Street North. This part of the Store replaces a home of the previous owner of the Store, and is situated now on the block that was once number 409. The Residence is now behind this Post Office, and the building extensions and renovations carried out by Maryanne and Frank about nine years ago have made a big difference to this store.







LITTLE BENDIGO - Office No.402.

(Name changed to Nerrina November 1, 1881.)

The Little Bendigo Post Office opened in June 1862 with the Postmaster J.McKenney (or J.McKenna – hard to decipher the exact name) in charge with the salary of Ten Pounds per annum. Oscar Skogland was the next in charge. While Oscar Skogland was Postmaster from 1869-1889 the name of the Post Office was changed to Nerrina Post Office. The next postmasters were Hugh Day in 1889, Andrew Milligan in 1892 and Margaret Leonard in 1900.



Postal facility Closed October 20, 1971.

Some records were missing, but apparently in 1902 the post office changed its residence from Hunter to Day and then to the site of Mrs. Duncan's house on the opposite side of street from the present site of post office, and then the location of the Post Office was apparently changed again in December 1912 while Mr. Duncan was Postmaster.



Ballarat Post Office – Corner of Sturt and Lydiard Streets. Tenders were called for the erection of a Post Office at Ballarat in December 1857. This Post Office was under construction during April 1864.



The Star November 5, 1859

"We perceive that the old Post Office at the corner of Mair and Lydiard streets, is now in process of removal, the purchaser at the recent sale being busy in carrying out so far the terms of purchase. Thus the old chums who were wont to stand by the hour in all weathers, and curse the Government for not providing better postal accommodation will henceforth only have the site of their past tribulations to provoke the angry memory of the past, or call up the pleasant sense of the pleasanter present. The Golden Fleece Hotel too, one of the oldest buildings in Lydiard street, and associated with not a few public gatherings in Ballarat, has been sold, and is now being removed piecemeal to make room for the new bank about to be created on the site".


