

HALLS

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BROWN HILL HALL

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The Christian Association Hall. This was to be used as a Mechanics Institute Hall. The site was in Thompson Street behind the Wesleyan Church and this was proclaimed in the gazette as follows – "Order in Council of the 6th February 1865 temporarily reserving 1 rood of land at Brown Hill, Ballarat East for the use of the Literary Association"


The Literary Association started on the 14th August 1858 and by 1861 the members had delivered 130 lectures, which included Scripture, history, biography and doctrine, astronomy, temperance, geology, geography, zoology, ethics and even phonography. Histories of different cultures, slavery, water, music and whatever other subjects you could think of, it was discussed and debated. The rules included for the benefit of Christian denominations, the lecture must be of a Christian tendency and the speaker must not read from notes but the speaker may choose his own subject.

This hall was situated in Thompson Street and was between the Wesleyan School and the Brown Hill National School. It was 26 feet long, with 10 feet high walls, with a structure at the top to allow lighting from the windows above to give ample lighting for maps and diagrams. It was estimated that the whole cost including the building, furnishing, fencing, plus planting of the Reserve would not exceed One Hundred and Fifty Pounds (\$300). They started off with a library worth Forty Pounds. James Oddie who was Patron of the Literary Association laid the foundation stone on The 27th June 1861.

The Brown Hill Literary Association held an election every three years under instruction from the Lands Department. In 1936 the Management Committee consisted of S.Wilmont, N.J.Lane, F.W.Tucker, W.Bawden, R.Huggins, which was the same as it had been in 1933. Due to the Depression years, and then followed by the years of the 2nd World War, it must have been very hard to maintain this old hall.

On October 2nd 1940 this reserve was revoked in the Victorian Gazette.

In 1941 this land was purchased by the Methodist Church with the hope of building a Manse for a Resident Minister. After a long drawn out process of raising money for a residence and having approval from the Church body for a Manse to be built, this was achieved in 1962 at a cost of Six Thousand Six Hundred Pounds. The first resident Minister being the Rev. Warren Clarnette.



First Hall – Thomas Ryan is known to have a store at the Brown Hill Flat in 1853. It has been recorded that there was a Hall at Brown Hill in 1854 and that the "gay dances and parties" disturbed the new residents and was eventually closed as a hall. This is presumed to be the Brown Hill Store that was there in 1853. Thomas Ryan opened the Hotel in January 1857 and then opened the Post Office in the Hotel & Store in December 1857.

Gong Gong Ballroom - as reported in the newspaper -

"A huge hotel, two storeys high, the Gong Gong Hotel stood where the residence of Mr.H.Ainley now stands near Stewart's Brown Hill Post Office. The upper storey covered the whole building and was then well known as the Gong Gong Ballroom. Old identities declare that they had many a gay night in this

ballroom and they further acclaim that the old-time dances were of a superior type than those of the present day."

This hotel and ballroom was destroyed by fire in 1882.

Apollo Hall – A Hall built next door to the Brown Hill Hotel by the Publican, George Schmidt, who was the licensee of the Hotel in 1882-1886. This Hall was used for accommodation during the Fireman's Demonstration staged at the Russell Square in 1885 by the Portland brigade and support group due to being unable to obtain accommodation elsewhere.

Knockshegona Hall -

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The site of this Hall was on Gong Gong Road (now Daylesford Road) and the BP Service Station and Store owned by Mick Kennedy was on the site of O'Day's Bakery. The Western Highway Bypass has now been built on this site.

According to a report in the paper Knockshegona Hall

"Was originally a bakehouse owned by the late Patrick O'Day and stood just over the city boundary at the top of the hill at the extreme eastern end of Humffray Street. Later when it ceased to function as a bakehouse the huge building began to be used as a dance hall. Destroyed by fire in the early 1900's the piano was saved by several willing helpers. Later this piano after much needed repairs had been effected, found its way into the Progress Hall."

Mr. Turner apparently started off this Hall and he was President of the Brown Hill Progress Association when the Hall closed.

Brown Hill Progress Association Hall situated at the corner of Humffray Street North and Bawden Street.

This hall from all accounts, which was moved into Humffray Street North, was part of the original Mount Egerton Primary School. According to the booklet "Mount of Gold – Centenary of Mt.Egerton Primary School" they state that in about 1935 owing to small numbers enrolled a large classroom which was attached to the south side of the school was removed to increase the size of the Black Hill Primary School. It is believed that this was the building that was used for the second home of the Brown Hill Progress Association. Mr.Barlow transported the building to Humffray Street.

In 1931 the Progress Association was in contact with the Department of Lands and Survey to acquire a black of land in Humffray Street North. The allotment was number 12, section 221, Parish of Ballarat, County of Grant. The land was apparently under a Miner's Right Title.

"October 1931 – Premiers Office – Secretary for Lands – "I forward for your consideration and reply a letter which I have received from the Acting Secretary of the Brown Hill Progress Association with reference to the site of the Associations Hall being made freehold".

They subsequently obtained the freehold title to this land, and another report by the Inspector of land on the 23rd October 1931

"On the site is erected a Hall fifty-three feet by twenty feet, weatherboard, Iron roof with ventilators, lined inside with pine boarding. New hard wood floor has been put in and other improvements and two outside water closets"

City of Ballarat wrote to the Lands Department on the 15th June 1931 – "In connection with the Brown Hill Progress Association Hall, which has been recently erected in Humffray Street, Brown Hill, the Council have decided that application be made to have the road and drainage Reserve deviated so as to extend through to Humffray Street in a straight line from the Yarrowee Creek on a bearing of 143 degrees 45 feet and a width of one chain as now.

This Council is prepared to pay the necessary survey fee for the work to be done by your Departmental Surveyors. It will necessitate the altering of the fence alignment of Mr.W.Daw's property, 291 Humffray Street North, and I have to report that he is agreeable to this being done. The Brown Hill Progress Association are also desirous of seeing this road straightened. I therefore place this matter before you for your consideration and if same is agreeable to your Department for necessary action."


On the 20th July 1934 the report was as follows –

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"Allotment has been levelled, kitchen has been installed, painting of the whole building, a new hard wood dancing floor and various additions and repairs – I now value the total improvements at Four Hundred and Seventy Pounds"

The Hall was in constant use and used for a variety of community functions including concerts, Punch & Judy shows for the school children, pantomimes and of course in the evening dances, which some of our local residents still remember.

Fire destroyed this Hall in 1937-38.




The community for their social gatherings, concerts and fund-raising for various functions then used St.Mark's Church of England Hall and the Methodist Sunday Sunday-School Hall.

BP Service Station. This was the site of the Knockshegowna Hall at the top of the hill, and which was previously O'Day's Bakery. Much later, this site was built on by Mick Kennedy who had a Garage, Bp Service Station and Store, plus the paddock next door to train his trotting horses.

Brown Hill Public Hall

On the 11th November 1957 a public Meeting was held to gauge the interest in building a Public Hall for Brown Hill. Since the Brown Hill Progress Associations Hall loss in 1937, the community had been without a public hall, and where currently using the Kiosk at the Swimming Pool, St.Mark's Church of England Hall and the Methodist Sunday School Hall, with none of these being able to entertain large groups such as dancing. At this inaugural meeting the Swimming Pool Advancement Committee handed over two hundred pounds (\$400) which had been held in trust from the demise of the last hall.

The site for the Hall was land previously owned by Mr.Jack Callinan, and this block extended back into the Reserve. Portion of the block was used for the Reserve to make the Cricket Oval and the front portion was allocated for the site of the Hall. On the town side of the Hall is the Brown Hill Swimming Pool.

TO ALL BROWN HILL RESIDENTS

No doubt you have noticed the Public Hall now being constructed beside your Swimming Pool. The construction has reached the close-up stage and the Committee is now out of funds.

Over the last eight years the committee, with the help of its Laides' Auxiliary, has raised over £4,400. This money plus a grant of £3,000 from the Victorian State Government and £1,600 from the Ballarat City Council, has been used to construct the hall to its present stage. BROWN HILL PUBLIC HALL APPEAL

In 1958 a house to house canvas for "BROWN HILL PUBLIC HALL APPEAL" raised \$270, swimming Pool Carnival \$102, Concert \$65, Christmas Dinner Special Effort \$157, Melbourne Cup Contest \$160, Dance \$41. At the first Annual Meeting at the end of 1958 they had raised \$2,142 of this the Ladies Committee had raised \$381. The aim was to raise \$6,000 being the price that was estimated for a solid brick hall, and of course anticipating that the Council and Government would be obliging enough to provide a grant to help build this public hall.

In 1959 the Brown Hill Hotel Social Club held a special for a Christmas Dinner resulting in \$11.50 and at the following hall committee meeting they were advising members that the Hall Committee had to have \$3000 before they could apply for a Grant of \$3000. They then organised the Melbourne Life Saving Association to stage a demonstration on a Friday Evening and a Swimming Carnival on the day following.

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
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During the years before the hall was built they held concerts, fairs, bottle drives, euchre nights, silver circles, dances, carnivals, swimming carnivals, with the ladies auxiliary staging a "Pick-a-Box" night, and so the community kept working for the projected target of \$3000.


In November 1961 arrangements of finance were made with the Ballarat City Council, and then finally after plans had been drawn up on several occasions the City Engineer was ready to call tenders in July 1963. The tender for plumbing of Hall in December 1963 was One thousand nine hundred and ninety eight pounds (\$3,996). By December 1964 the Hall Committee had the bad news that the tenders were too high, so they recalled tenders for just the main part of the Hall to lock-up stage. By February 1965, 2 months later, tenders had bee finally accepted and the building commenced. The Contractors account was \$4,300, electrician \$490. In March 1966 the first working bee was held to put in the timber for the floor. The cost of timber being \$1,508 and the window fittings cost \$200.

The Hall was officially opened on the 2nd December 1966. The Courier gave over a whole page in reporting "The Ball" that was organised for the Official Opening. So for approximately \$10,500 the BROWN HILL HALL was built, officially opened, and a marvellous night with a packed hall to mark the occasion. Not to forget the community work carried out for the past nine years to have sufficient funds to achieve this project.




The work of course was not complete and arrangements were made to hold a Ball in May, a White Elephant Sale, and a Cabaret Ball later in the year, as well as the weekly Euchre nights, Coffee Parties and Dances. The following year they extended the program to a New Years Eve Dance with the ladies once again catering for the supper.




labour and the Stage was built in August with voluntary labour. Finally in December 1969 the flooring of the Meeting and Supper room was completed at a cost of \$520. Extensions completed for approximately \$9,000. What a great achievement by a very supportive community and what a great asset it has been to the area. (Numerous Working Bees were carried out by tradesmen and other willing people.)

The Brown Hill Hall is currently being extended on the eastern side, and the house next door has been removed to make access for off-street car parking plus a garden area on the boundary next to the reserve. The Hall extensions, to be completed in 2004, with the off-street Car Parking to be made available when funds become available.



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BROWN HILL PROGRESS ASSOCIATION

The Brown Hill Progress Association first started using the Knockishigowna Hall for its meetings. This hall was originally in Gong Gong Road (now called Daylesford Road), and next to the Woolpack Hotel. At this time there was the Eureka Progress Association, Black Hill Associations, plus other progress associations, all working on behalf of their communities and liasing with their elected Councillors to present the communities view on the current needs in the area and what could be done to improve the situation within the confines of the Councils financial restraints. Each district of course requiring the standard of roads, footpaths, lighting, and reserves to be maintained and kept up to a standard that the citizens of Ballarat could be proud of.



It has not been found out when the first Brown Progress Association started, but in 1922 the Brown Hill Progress Association wrote to the Council, stating that the condition of Ryan Street was "unfit for any class of traffic", but they did get the okay to have trees planted on the nature strip of Thompson Street to beautify the area. The Knockishigowna Hall was destroyed by fire early in the 1900's and later the Progress Association lapsed for members.

The Brown Hill Progress Association was reformed with new zeal and the aim of a new Hall for the Progress Association and the Public to have a hall for the benefit of all the community. It is believed that the south side of the Mount Egerton Primary School was moved to Brown Hill for the new Progress Hall in the 1930's. Reference to the low numbers at the Mount Egerton School in the 1930's and the Department having one very large schoolroom removed and sent to Ballarat is mentioned in the Centenary "Mount of Gold" booklet, although it was presumed by them that this building went to the Black Hill Primary School.

In 1931, the Progress Association was in contact with the Department of Lands and Survey to acquire a block of land in Humffray Street North. The allotment was 12, section 221, Parish of Ballarat, County of Grant.

Premiers Office - Secretary for Lands (October 1931).

"I forward for your consideration and reply a letter which I have received from the Acting Secretary of the Brown Hill Progress Association with reference to the site of the Associations Hall being made freehold."

Which of course means that the land that they were currently obtaining for the site of their hall was then under a Miner's Right Title and they of course wanted to acquire freehold title to assure that this asset belonged to the Progress Association. They subsequently obtained the freehold title to this land. The Inspector of Land reported on the 23rd October 1931 -

"On the site is erected a Hall fifty-three feet by twenty feet, weatherboard, Iron roof with ventilators, lined inside with pine boarding. New hard wood floor has been put in and other improvements and two outside water closets."

City of Ballarat wrote to the Lands Department on the 15th June 1932,

"In connection with the Brown Hill Progress Association Hall, which has been recently erected in Humffray Street, Brown Hill the Council have decided that application be made to have the road and drainage Reserve deviated so as to extend through to Humffray Street in a straight line from the Yarrowee Creek on a bearing of 143 degrees 45 feet and a width of one chain as now.

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

The Brown Hill Progress Association who met regularly at a Hall in Humffray Street North just a short distance away from the Brown Hill Post Office. The President was Mr.Lynch, Snr.Vice President Mr.J.Calnin Jnr.Vice Presidents J.Devany and T.Comrie and Secretary Mr.E.Ellis.





The Brown Hill Progress Association Hall was situated on the corner of Humffray Street North and an unnamed street. This street is now called Bawden Street. Hall was on the right-hand corner.



The present Brown Hill Progress Association was reformed when a meeting was called by the then Mayor of the City of Ballarat, Cr.Maurice Brown. The meeting was called for the 14th May 1969, with His Worship the Mayor of the City of Ballarat Councillor M.Brown. Present were Mr.R.Cracknell, Mrs.R.Cracknell, Mr.G.Davidson, Mr.J.Ainley, Councillor M.Brown, Mr.E.Bawden, Mrs.J.Birkett, Mrs. C. Calaby, Mr.H.Foo, Mr. M. Foo, Mr.G.Johnston, Councillor A.C.Rizzoli, Mr.L.Rinaldi, Mrs.L.Rinaldi, Mrs.W.Plover, Mr.G.Schaefer, Miss. M.O.Morgan, Mr.F.Tolliday, Mr.N.Whitcher, Mr.R.White, Mr.E.Walsh, Mr.R.Whitcher, Mr.L.Shannon, Miss.C.Woodward, with apologies from Mr.Murray Byrne M.L.C., and Councillor W.E.Roff. The Mayor recalled work done in the latter years and the need for a strong body to co-operate with the City Council to achieve the desired results.

Mr.Melton Foo was elected as President, Vice President Mr.G.Davidson, Secretary Miss.C.Woodward, Treasurer Mr.Leo Shannon and members present to form the membership of the newly formed Brown Hill Progress Association.

In the Annual Report of 1970 the Progress Association had adopted Cr.Brown's suggestion of building a Kindergarten at Brown Hill. The association formed a Kindergarten Committee and this of course set the aim of raising money for this project. A Bonfire and Barbecue Night were held, Film Night and a Fair, plus a Co-operative Loan Society formed for this venture. A discussion on Residence Area Titles was held with representatives of the Ballarat East Ratepayers Advancement Association and the Nerrina Progress Association being present and the problems of securing Freehold Titles. The neverending saga of the conditions of footpaths and school crossings were referred to the Council for their attention.

In 1971 the Annual Report that a sub-committee had been formed to establish a Senior Citizen's Club in Brown Hill and that this had been achieved and had started in December 1971. A sub-committee had also been formed to start up a Youth Club at Brown Hill and a sub-committee was also formed to try and bring about the establishment of a tramway museum in the Lake Wendouree area.

The 1972 Annual Report by the Sub-Committee were finding it very trying to co-ordinate, Health Department, Local Government, Lands Department and the various bodies to have a reserve for the Kindergarten passed and the plans of a Kindergarten to proceed. By this time they had formed a Ladies Catering Committee, which eventually changed to the Kindergarten Ladies Auxiliary committee. This committee proceeded to run their first Cabaret Ball, which was a huge success.

By 1974 The Council were advising that the Toilets for the Reserve had now risen to number 3 on the priority list. The site of the Kindergarten was still being inspected by the Lands Department, ensuring that no building be built on a disused mine site. However in July 1973 the City Council and the tendor had called tenders was let for the amount of \$24,176.00, but due to unstable ground a solid foundation could not be obtained and a new site was to be investigated. This new site was at the rear of Goldsmiths property in Reid Street. The Ballarat Highland Pipe Band was holding discussions with the Progress Association with the idea of moving their Band Rooms to a site on the Reserve. A White Elephant Sale was held during the year and over \$400 was raised with the money being allocated to improvements of the oval and children's playing ground at the rear of the Swimming Pool.

The Progress Association then approached the Lands Department to secure possession of the land north of the Kindergarten with the idea of developing and improving for recreation. This resulted in the Progress Association being made a Committee of Management for the Reserve. The Association was also asked to represent the community and give support to encourage meetings and debates about the proposed Northern Expressway (which was originally to come down the Old Melbourne Road and Scott's Parade).

The Brown Hill Progress Association also tried to help in our community maintaining the original name of our primary school – Brown Hill. Unfortunately this was one project that they did not succeed in – and to people of today, that still ask, why was our school name changed? Government policy is very hard to fathom and change.

Dear Resident,

As you are no doubt aware, the interim School Council of the Ballarat East/Brown Hill Primary School has selected the name "Caledonian Primary School" to replace the name that has existed since 1877, namely Brown Hill Primary School.

This decision was taken in early 1994 under Directorate of School Education guidelines for changing school names. The reason for the change came about as a result of the Quality Provision Process in 1993, when it was decided by both Brown Hill and Ballarat East (Queen Street) Primary School Councils that the schools should unite.

The Directorate of School Education guidelines also indicate that the interim school council must seek the approval of the relevant municipal body (Ballarat City Council) and this approval was given in late April 1994. However the final decision on the renaming of public institutions rests with a body called the Place Names Committee which is part of the Department of the Premier and Cabinet.

All residents have the right to object to the proposed renaming following advertisement of the proposed change in the Victorian Government Gazette. This particular name change proposal appeared in the Gazette of 29 September 1994 and allows objections to be made in writing within two months of the advertisement (i.e. 28 November 1994).

It is the strong view of the Brown Hill Progress Association that the proposed name change is not required and the school should remain known as Brown Hill.

If you feel the same, you may like to send the attached letter to the Place Names Committee. Alternatively, you may wish to use that letter as the base for your own more personalised letter. All letters should reach the Place Names Committee by the 28 November 1994. 
