

## HOTELS - BROWN HILL - BALLARAT

## AND THE ROADS TRAVELLED IN THE AREA

During the early days of Ballarat the people who were not looking for gold were busy starting new businesses, carting water, grocery stores, clothing, and of course a supply of liquor. Hotels flourished very rapidly in Ballarat and most were within walking distances of the miners. Others were strategically placed along main roads from town to town within riding distances on a horse. The closer to the heart of the town the more palatial became the building.

The staple of life was bread, and by 1854 a Bakery was for sale stating they baked three and a half tons of flour per week, with an assured supply of wood for their two ovens. A price war for bread occurred in 1857 with the price of a four pound loaf of bread being lowered by 25% to one and sixpence (15c) with bread being delivered by cart tent to tent to sell their bread before their opposition.

Water for bathing was another problem, and the Red Hill Swimming Baths were advertised "adjoining the Windsor Hotel, George King has regardless of expense, erected a swimming bath four and a half feet by twenty one and a half feet, and having made arrangements with Mr.Kirk for a continual supply of pure water, will be opened on Saturday"

In the same year as the price of war for bread was going on, and the Windsor was attracting patrons with Swimming Baths, "the Unicorn Hotel was sold to Thomas Vaughan for the sum of Five Thousand and Fifty Pounds sterling. Consisting of about a quarter of an acre of land in Sturt Street with the hotel and offices attached all of which are built of timber." This was also the year the Brown Hill Hotel's humble beginning started, obtaining a hotel license on the 12<sup>th</sup> June 1857. Ten years later, the Eagle Hotel in Armstrong Street was advertising a pint of ale for threepence.

In the 1870's, the Hotels were complaining about the charge by the Water Commission of 10 shillings per year for water to fill the horse troughs in front of their establishments.

During the 1880's the temperance movement was much in vogue, with wives of miners and town folk, trying to build a respectable town. The licensing board closed some of the smaller establishments, trying to control the number of hotels in existence, but trading still continued to 11.30pm.

In 1916 the Temperance Society won the war, the goldfields had been replaced with townships and families, and gradually the mines began to peter out in the 1880's thus the rollicking times of "rags to riches" by 1916 had ceased. The hotels were now to close at 6pm.

Votes and referendums were taken for years after to change the closing time, but due to the 1<sup>st</sup> World War, The Depression and the 2<sup>nd</sup> World War, the rights of a drink

after 6pm was not high on the agenda. After the Second World War finished in 1945 communities started to come back to a normal lifestyle. With more people at work, and the future looking brighter, the time of closing hotels was put back on the agenda in the 1950's, and finally in 1966 the vote for ten o'clock closing was passed with hotels being able to open until 10pm. Meals and music once again came to the Hotels - instead of just the Men's bar area and a small secluded Ladies Room - the rooms were opened up and extended for mixed patronage.



Started as "The Glen" in 1866. Melbourne Road is now the Western Highway.







#### BROWN HILL HOTEL – Humffray Street North.

Opened June 1857. First licensee was Mr.T.Ryan. This hotel is still operating.

This hotel is shown on the 1861 Map. Mr.Ryan is also listed in the Bryce Ross's Directory of 1853 as having a Store at Brown Hill. As a patron of the National School at Brown Hill, he was listed as having a Store and a Hotel in 1857. The first Brown Hill Post Office was started in Ryan's Store in 1857.








<u>EASTERN RAILWAY</u> - Humffray Street North - (1882) is now replaced with Rumerz Tavern and the Leagues Club, Pokies & Dinning.

EASTERN STATION - Cnr Humffray & Rowe Streets. (1862)

Extensive renovations have taken place over the last few years and it is now a Licensed Guest House. Sold in June 2002, and still incorporating the lovely stained glass windows on the Rowe Street side of the Hotel with the lettering "Eastern Station" incorporated into the stained window. In 2004 this Hotel became a B & B, but it still operates with a licence and has its original bar area. It is thought that this might be the two-storied hotel that Thomas Hunt built, In addition, was listed as the licensee of in 1863. He had originally owned the Prince of Wales Hotel in Brown Hill and then opened another Hotel called the Prince of Wales Hotel in Humffray Street North between Mair Street and the Railway Line. "We must not omit to notice that Mr.Hunt, of the Prince of Wales Hotel, Humffray Street has nearly completed the erection of a handsome two-storied brick hotel at the corner of Humffray Street and Scott's Parade. The design is by Mr.Black, and the building includes some 30 rooms. The cost of the erection will be about 1200 pounds" as reported in the Miner & Weekly Star 27/6/1862.



<u>FELLMONGERS ARMS</u> - Fire damaged in 1911. Licensee in1859 Aldrich Edward. Set back from Gong Gong Road on the Brewery Tap Road. Last publican Mr.Nestor on March 6, 1902 (Lot No.29) Thomas Nestor bought the Fellmonger's Arms at Gong Gong from Mary O'Connor. Hotel was destroyed by fire on June 2, 1911.


This Hotel was advertised For Sale in May 1858 with the following notice -

"to sell by public auction, on the above-named day, on the premises, immediately after the sale of that property known as the Fellmonger's, lately occupied by Mr.Castilla, those extensive and substantially built premises, known as —

THE FELLMONGER'S ARMS, AND STORES, lately in the occupation of Mr.Edwards, consisting of a **well built HOTEL**, containing eight rooms, with bar and fitting; also, store adjoining, with counter shelves, &c, &c., the whole being enclosed with a secure fence and large garden, together with a well assorted stock of groceries, drapery, &c. The auctioneer would call special attention to the sale, as, from the immense traffic and large population now settled in this locality, it must command a handsome competency to the purchaser. Terms – Cash – Sale at twelve o'clock sharp."

On the same day without any reserve, the following valuable property lately occupied by Mr.Castilla (fellmonger) situated at Brown Hill, Ballarat consisting of extensive woolshed, combing rooms, drying room, large stabling, outhouses, four roomed cottage, men's huts, drying ground, drays, hides, chaffcutter, woolpacks. This business was apparently next to the Fellmonger's Arms Hotel, and they stressed the fact that the business was next

to a "never failing supply of water".




GONG GONG HOTEL - Daylesford Road 1875-1882. First licensee E.Giles.

This was previously the "Sons of Freedom Hotel". Mrs.Giles advertised on 12<sup>th</sup> March 1875 that she would be applying for a licence for a Hotel which would be named the Gong Gong Hotel. Sadly, Mrs.Giles died from complications in giving birth to a child in April of that year.

Fire caused the hotel to close in 1882. (Daylesford Road was commonly Called Gong Gong Road.)

(On the 1882 Ballarat Directory this hotel is shown to be Situated between John Reid, carter, and Benjamin Avent, carpenter, at the end of Humffray Street North, with Carr as the Licensee. Mr. George Carr had previously been the Blacksmith next to the Brown Hill Post Office. Licensees were Ellen Giles and then James Giles in 1875-76, Stevenson in 1876-77, George Carr in 1878-1882.

View of Humffray Street North – Gong Gong Hotel was situated on the right-hand side of this photo.

This licence was transferred to The Imperial Hotel in 1882, after the damage by fire to the Gong Gong Hotel. One of the interesting aspects of this Hotel is that it was apparently over the years enlarged and became a two storey building and was very well known as the Gong Gong Ballroom, for its musical and dance programs.

MEAGHER'S HOTEL - 194 Victoria Street, near Buninyong Railway Line.

Licensee in 1875 James Meagher, Melbourne Road, (Victoria Street.).

Closed late 1990's (Previously the Bricklayers Arms Hotel, then Jacksons, Northages and then Meaghers.) The tollgate was near this hotel.

Meagher's Hotel, Victoria Street. (Not operating now)
To the left of the photo the walk way across the Buninyong
Railway line. This road has just been made into a dual
highway across the old Railway bridge.

IMPERIAL HOTEL - Corner of Humffray & Mair Streets. (1857 - 1907)

Fire on Bakery Hill – "Considerable excitement was occasioned yesterday afternoon a little after five o'clock, by an alarm of fire on the Bakery Hill Road, near the Black Hill. The alarm was but too well grounded, as a fire had broken out in a calico tent, adjoining the IMPERIAL HOTEL, on the west side. The tent was burnt in a few seconds, and the gable end of the hotel being of wood and close to the tent, with the wind blowing right on to it, soon caught."

"The hotel was a mass of flames in a fearfully short space of time, and was, with the large new wooden erection adjoining, completely destroyed in about fifteen minutes, only a few articles of furniture and the valuables being rescued. Fortunately the three places enumerated formed an isolated block, having a space of some forty or fifty feet clear at each end, and thus the fire was saved from communicating with the other dwellings. The tents in the rear were also saved; one or two intervening tents of small value being pulled down. The heat of the flames was so intense that a shingle chimney on the opposite site of the way exhibited at one time rather unpleasant signs of incipient ignition. The shingle-roofed place beyond the burnt block on the east and leeward side got a scorching too, but was saved by being covered with watered woollens."

"The Fire Brigade hook and ladder apparatus was quickly on the spot, and we remarked Messrs. Boyd, Dyte, and others of the Brigade, actively engaged in throwing water on the burning ruins, the water being supplied from watercarts. The engine was at last got into play from the Flat, the water from the two lines of hose completing the extinguishment already begun by the men of buckets. The Police, under Inspector Taylor, were very promptly on the spot, and kept excellent order among the large crowd. What might have been the limit of the conflagration, had it broken out in the night, it is difficult to say, as although the neighbourhood is not densely peopled, and the wind was favourable, the dry condition of everything combustible after the hot wind of the previous day, renders it extremely probable that the extent of the danger would have been much greater. The Fire Brigade made their appearance towards the close. The rapid manner in which the buildings were destroyed, rendered their efforts of little avail, and beyond quenching the embers their services on the occasion were fortunately not required for further exertion." Before the construction of the Railway Line, this hotel was situated at approximately where the railways good sheds are. Burnt down in fire 24/12/1857 as written up in The Star on Christmas Day. Rebuilt, and then sold on April, 7, 1862, to make way for extra land for the Railways.

The Hotel at the corner of Wills (Mair Street) and Humffray Street was then called the Imperial Hotel, apparently after the previous hotel. The Hotel was re-opened as the WELCOME NUGGET and then later traded as the BLARNEY INN. Fire damaged. Then renovated and extended and renamed the GAMEKEEPERS SECRET.







QUEENS HEAD HOTEL - Started in 1862 were the current bottle shop is and then built on the corner of Queen and Humffray St.Nth. Still operating today. The inquest of the bulger from the Ballarat Volunteer Ranges in 1864, after he had been found tragically in a muddy watery mine hole was held at this hotel. Police Constable McNally carrying the man to the Queen's Head Hotel, which was close by.

The Black Hill Flat was a very busy mining area.

SONS OF FREEDOM - First Licensee T.F. McKenna 1865.

The first licence was obtained for a dwelling containing a bar, two sitting rooms and two bedrooms, in Humffray Street North. (This was in the middle of the block between Turner's the Butchers, the Brown Hill Post Office and Gregory Street (now called Duggan Street). The Licence was granted in the Ballarat East Court on October 6, 1865. The next licensee was James Tyack and Catherine Tyack.


In March 1875 a new Licence was issued and the new Licensee named it the Gong Gong Hotel.

- WHITE SWAN HOTEL Owned by W.Ritchie. Situated on Springs Road. This land was unfortunately the site chosen for the White Swan Reservoir. What is left of the hotel is now under the water contained in the White Swan Reservoir.
- WOODMANS INN Melbourne Road (1864). Was originally a changing post for Horses and coaches. (Later became known as Woodman's Arms.) Situated at the top of Woodman's Hill. (Closed by Reduction Board in 1915.)
- WOOLPACK HOTEL, Gong Gong Road. (1872-1936). This is, of course, is now called the Daylesford Road. First licensee Ditchburn. This was one of the many hotels to be given notice by the Licensing Reduction Board in 1925. Many of these hotels kept trading until the end of the time allowed. After many reprieves this hotel was closed in 1936. Last licensee Ellen McGrath. It was situated next door to O'Days bakery. (Western Highway Bypass is now on this site.)

<u>VICTORIA HOTEL</u> - Victoria Street (now known as Old Melbourne Road).

This hotel was situated near Ryan Street. First licensee J.Fallon in 1869.

Closed by Reduction Board in 1921.



NATIVE YOUTH HOTEL - Humffray Street North - Cnr.Haines Street - 1859 Shown on 1861 Map. This hotel was advertised for Sale Sept 2, 1857 with the following description –

"The undersigned are instructed by the proprietor, to dispose of by private sale, those premises situated at Little Bendigo, known as THE NATIVE YOUTH HOTEL. Comprising a substantially built weatherboard and shingled building, containing a spacious bar and fittings, complete, with good cellar underneath, bar-parlour, sittingroom and two bedrooms, a recently erected bagatelle-room, detached kitchen and outhouses, stabling for six horses, coach-house, &c., enclosed by a spacious well fenced yard. The stock, &c., may be taken at a valuation, the terms very liberal. Full particulars may be taken on application to Mitchison Brothers, Main Road."

### PRINCE OF WALES HOTEL - Brown Hill Flat.

This Hotel was apparently at the Brown Hill Flat in July 1857 with the Licensee Mr.Hunt. The hotel was advertised for sale on the 1<sup>st</sup> February 1858, as

"a first-rate property, and doing a good business. The furniture and stock to be taken as agreed. Also, one of the best Conveyance Carts in the colony, with patent axles, two sets plated harness, and a handsome grey horse, fit for any purpose (a good opportunity for any person commencing the conveyancing business), light dray and harness, etc. Apply to Thos.Hunt, proprietor, on the premises".

PRINCE OF WALES HOTEL – Humffray Street North between Mair Street & the Railway line. By June 1862 Thomas Hunt had built a two storeyed Hotel. "Mr.Hunt, of the Prince of Wales Hotel, Humffray Street, has nearly completed the erection of a handsome two-storied brick hotel at the corner of Humffray Street and Scott's Parade. The design is by Mr.Black, and the building includes 30 rooms. The cost of the erection will be about One Thousand Two Hundred Pounds." As reported in the Miner & Weekly Star 27/6/1862.

BLACK HILL HOTEL - Situated in Humffray Street opposite the Red Bull Hotel.

SAWYERS' ARMS HOTEL – South East Corner of Oliver and Humffray Street Containing a bar, two sitting rooms and four bedrooms. Hotel opened in October 1864. Licensee George Gude. This Hotel later became the Salutation Hotel with the licensee being Annie Olsen in 1867.

#### CAPE OF GOOD HOPE HOTEL - Brown Hill

In January 1863 this Hotel was advertised for Sale and it also mentioned that it was situated near Mr.Ryan's Hotel, which was the Brown Hill Hotel in Humffray Street. The Advertisement in The Star Newspaper reads as follows-

"For Sale - That old established business place known as the CAPE OF GOOD HOPE HOTEL AND STORE on Brown Hill, near Mr.Ryan. Doing

a very good cash business at present, principally at all the saw mills in Bullarook Forest, where upwards of sixty families are weekly served with all the necessaries of life, and which can easily by doubled without any extra expense. The only reason for selling is that the present occupier is leaving for home, on account of ill health. Full particulars may be had from Mr.Lofven, at Messrs.Tuxon and Co's. Main Road, Ballarat, or on the premises. Also for sale, a first-rate cottage piano, chap; a patent mangle; and a lot of goats."

On the same day as this Cape of Good Hope Hotel Store was for sale The Plank Road Hotel (Main Road) was advertised for sale plus Livery Stalls and they made sure they mentioned the fact that it was besides a Government road. The Hotel was advertised as having every convenience and then the sale of Casey's Cabs & Horses, which comprised of "One American Carryall, five Buninyong Cars, a Single Brake and Water Cart with suitable harness for all, plus SIXTEEN HORSES, twenty (20) Horse Stalls, Coach and Car Sheds.

### GOLDEN ROOSTER RECEPTION CENTRE

Enoch Wuelfing built this Reception Centre in 1968, on an old chicken farm in Lovfen Street, Nerrina. Originally Mr. Wuelfing came out to the Melbourne Olympics in 1956 as the Chef for the German Olympic team. He even went back to Germany to import the Hungarian Bavarian Lights for the Reception Centre.

The fully licensed Reception Centre opened as the first licensed restaurant in Ballarat to hold 200 people.


In a Surveyor's Report, in 1865, the surveyor stated that he had visited the Springs and Little Bendigo and recommended the construction of one bridge across the Yarrowee, and three culverts. Later a public meeting was held at the Speedwell Hotel to devise a means to obtain roads for their locality. It was decided to have one main road made by Mr.Lofven's Store and crossing the creek somewhere about the Band of Hope claim. This road would eventually connect the Springs district with Little Bendigo and Ballarat East. This Store of Mr.Lofven's is approximately, where the Reception Centre was built in Lofven Street.



### **NERRINA TAVERN**

The Golden Rooster Reception Centre was then purchased by Gull, (1970's) and apparently changed the complex to include the Nerrina Tavern. The licensees after Gull included Tony Bourke and Des Holloways.



## BURKIE'S TAVERN. - Situated at 73-75 Lofven Street.

In 1994 John Burke became the licensee of Nerrina Tavern and changed the name to Burkie's Tavern. In 2001 there was Brian Vince and for 3-4 months at the end of 2002 John Burke was once again operating Burkie's Tavern.






MONTE CHRISTO HOTEL - 1861

SPEEDWELL HOTEL - 1864 - 1915 (Closed by Reduction Board.)

LITTLE BENDIGO - At the end of Lofven Street. This hotel appears on the Surveyor's General Map of 1861 - Closed 1918 by Reduction Board. Devison, the first owner and licensee built the hotel.





In September 1857 they were advertising a Full Dress Ball for Wednesday Evening with Mons.Paltzer's Band. Tickets including refreshments, and lady and gentleman at 10s.6d, dancing to start at 9 p.m. In November 1857, they were advertising a "Full Dress Ball" with Charles Powell as Master of Ceremonies and Fleury's Dance Band. Tickets to admit Lady and Gentleman at 10s and 6d.

Appears on the 1861 Map. Believed to have closed in 1861.



EUREKA HOTEL - J.Dowling Licensee. 1882. (Situated at Little Bendigo)

SCANDINAVIAN HOTEL - Licensee O.Skogland 1861. Geo Nott, Licensee – The Star May 30, 1861

TEMPERANCE HOTEL -believed to have been situated in Lofven Street at approximately where the Western by-pass goes through.




