Brown Hill Progress Association announces a change in pool management

After 14 years and much discussion at the end of the 2020 summer, the Brown Hill Progress Association (BHPA) has decided to hand back the management of the Brown Hill Community Pool to the City of Ballarat (COB).

Over these 14 years, with the assistance of a squadron of volunteers and staff of the COB, we have seen the pool not only

remain open but thrive. We have seen many improvements in the structures and pool plant in addition to an ongoing maintenance program that has kept the facility compliant and safe for the fantastic families of Brown Hill and surrounds.

As well as the facility itself, it has been the terrific volunteer programs such as 'Learn to Swim' and 'Aquatic Zumba', plus the oneday events over each summer, that have made Brown Hill Community Pool one of the best patronised in the region.

The BHPA wishes to thank all of its volunteers for their thousands of hours given in assistance, the many groups and businesses (of special note the Brown Hill Uniting Church) for their financial and in-kind support, the City of Ballarat for all of its support, both financial and advisory over this period and our terrific crew of lifeguards who have come through the gate over the years. Last, but not least, thanks to the patrons for visiting the pool and for their support over this time. It has been hard work but very rewarding to watch families literally grow up in front of our eyes each season.

The pool is not closing and the BHPA will still be very actively involved with the running of community events in partnership with the COB throughout the coming summer. Roads, Footpaths and Traffic in Brown Hill

The Brown Hill Progress Association (BHPA) recently spoke with Charles Cahill, the Traffic Project Manager for the City of Ballarat (COB). In the past year, while the Brown Hill Local Area Plan remains on hold, the BHPA wrote to the COB outlining several issues with local footpaths, roads and traffic. Support was also given to a similar letter from Caledonian Primary School.

In response to these letters, Charles contacted the BHPA to let us know that the COB is working on options to resolve the traffic congestion around Caledonian Primary School at drop-off and pick-up times each school day.

The COB has recently completed several projects to improve safety:

* Additional 40 km/hr school zone sign on Brophy Street when entering from Water Street

* Footpath from Canterbury Street to the Caledonian Primary School crossing over Thompson Street

* Replacing the bluestone gutter on the Thompson Street school crossing with a concrete slope/ramp for safer access for bikes, scooters, prams and wheelchairs etc.

We are grateful to the COB for these improvements.

Charles explained some options that have been discussed with VicRoads in relation to the Water Street approach to Victoria Street under the heritage-listed Caledonian bluestone railway bridge.

Ideas include:

* Adding a lane, so there would be three lanes under the bridge, helping to clear traffic faster. This would not allow room for a footpath.

* A pedestrian tunnel under the railway line to replace the lost footpath.

* Perhaps relocating the supervised school crossings at the roundabout to take the pressure off traffic flow.

* Work with Caledonian Primary School to direct parents to the bigger drop-off zone in Water Street, rather than the front (Thompson Street) and back (Brophy Street) gates.

The BHPA also asked the COB to investigate options for a safe pedestrian crossing of Humffray Street North between Water Street (Brown Hill shops) and Stawell Street North (Russell Square). This is particularly relvant to families wanting to access Brown Hill Kindergarten, Caledonian Primary School and Woodmans Hill Secondary College.

The next step would involve further data collection of traffic volume and the number of families who cross Humffray Street North each day. We would support a general pedestrian crossing around Thompson Street, with a refuge island in the middle to give elderly people and kids a break before proceeding.

We also discussed traffic and pedestrian issues around the Water Street/Daylesford Road and Humffray Street North intersection.

The BHPA will continue working with the City of Ballarat on these projects.

Water Pipe Renewal

Central Highlands Water (CHW) manages 2,510 km of water mains, the oldest of which are over a century old.

In order to maintain our commitment to providing safe drinking water that meets regulatory water quality requirements, as well as reducing water wastage through leaks and bursts, CHW has an ongoing program of water mains renewals. Through this water pipe renewal project we are planning for the next 100 years.

The 75 mm cast iron water main in Canterbury, Haines and Lane Streets was originally installed circa 1948, making these assets over 70 years old. When Central Highlands Water assesses water mains for renewal, a number of criteria is used in order to prioritise works. These include the age of the asset, the number of pipe bursts that have occurred and the criticality of supply.

Due to the age, number of bursts and the fact that the main in Lane Street supplies a school, CHW's contractor is currently replacing these existing water mains with a new 100 mm OPVC pipe which has an estimated lifespan of 100 years.

This new, larger diameter pipe has 70% greater capacity than the pipe it replaces resulting in better flow and water pressure to the relevant properties. Once the new pipe is laid it has to be pressure tested and then the water quality needs to be checked before the new main is connected to these properties.

Central Highlands Water and its contractors endeavour to minimise interruptions to our customers, but it is at the point when the new pipe is ready to be connected to a property, that it is sometimes necessary to temporarily shut off the supply whilst the connection is moved over to the new main.

Should this be necessary the customer will be given at least two days' notice of a temporary interruption to their water supply. If residents have any questions regarding the project they can contact us.

Call for more Bus Shelters

Bus shelters were not installed at many new bus stops when Public Transport Victoria (PTV) introduced the new Ballarat Bus Network several years ago, as funding was not included.

In early 2020 I reached out to the City of Ballarat during the roadworks by Pipecon in Gracefield Road, Brown Hill, for a shelter for the new bus stop (ID50851). I was advised that funding was committed for 2019/20 and my request would be added to a list to be considered for inclusion in future, relative to other bus stops throughout the City of Ballarat area.

I believe there is a real need for all Brown Hill bus route #15 shelters to be clearly identified in the 'Bus Shelter Program' as part of the City of Ballarat Capital Works plan. There are at least 22 bus shelters I have identified, 13 on the way into the train station and 9 on the way out.

Bus shelters are an essential part of protecting the vulnerable, elderly, families and children in our community as they wait for a bus.

Let's everyone in our community identify bus shelters that are a priority to you and your loved ones, as I have done for my family, and we can have a clear timeline for implementation.

Brown Hill Fish and Chip Shop

Dianne Slater has worked at the Brown Hill Fish and Chip shop for almost 20 years and she still enjoys it. "It is like you're serving friends. It is good to come to work, have a chat and find out what's going on around the area."

In 2001, Dianne moved to Brown Hill. Around the same time, Marty Hancock bought the shop. She says, "He came and knocked on my door and asked if I wanted a job. I had worked at restaurants, bars and cafes, but never at a fish shop. I thought it would be easy."

It wasn't. Dianne says, "Everything was different. The way orders were done, the processes and structure. It was nothing like other places I had worked."

Marty went on to sell the shop to Monica, her husband Michael and their son David, who were from Daylesford. It seems Dianne was part of the deal. She says, "I guess by then I was like one of the shop fittings. There had been Marty and six staff. I was the only one they kept."

Monica and David ran the shop as a small family business and Dianne worked Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays. At the time, she also worked at the caravan park on Scott Parade (now a retirement village).

Up the road, Greg and Penny Fletcher owned the Brown Hill Pub. They sold it to buy the Fish and Chip shop from Monica and David. After 5 or 6 years, in 2013, it was time for another new owner. This time it was Dianne.

Now Dianne has a team of seven staff working at the Brown Hill Fish and Chip shop. Two of them, Stephanie and Harry, live in Brown Hill and she also employs her brother's grandson, Lachie. It's been busy during the lockdowns, so Dianne has employed staff whose normal jobs have been affected. They include CJ, Zach and Jordan. Dianne also employs Jorja, who is both an apprentice at the hairdresser's next door and daughter of Jo, who runs the Brown Hill Laundromat.

As several other local fish and chip shops are currently closed, Dianne says that the nearest shops are at Northway or Steve's in Sturt Street. That means that, for now, wait times can be up to an hour.

Dianne says that during this busy time, she prefers if you place your order over the phone, then wait outside to collect it.

She wants people with young

families who can't wait for an hour to consider calling during the day to place their order for that night and pre-book a collection time (call between 11.00 am and 2.00 pm or from 4.30 pm).

Dianne says she's worried about the potential effect of the shutdowns on the availability of seafood and meat deliveries, but she will just take it a day at a time.

If you need a hard copy of this newsletter, Dianne usually has a supply. She's one of our best distributors.

Please support Dianne and other local businesses in Brown Hill. They are such an important part of our community. Thanks for the delicious dinners Dianne!

Perridak Burron Early Learning Centre

Ballarat and District Aboriginal Cooperative (BADAC) will soon be providing Early Childhood Education and Care services for the Brown Hill community.

The early learning service: **Perridak Burron Early Learning Centre** (ELC) (meaning 'Platypus Children') will provide a culturally -safe and rich learning environment where families and the community are collaborators in each child's learning journey from birth through to school engagement.

Perridak Burron will combat and support the barriers and factors that affect Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families' participation in early years' education and share this journey with non-Aboriginal children.

Ballarat and District Aboriginal Cooperative are committed to the ongoing journey of closing the gap on educational disparities between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander and non-Aboriginal children, with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children twice as likely, in comparison to non-Aboriginal children, to be developmentally vulnerable when they start school. Evidence shows that equal access to high quality early childhood education and care services provides opportunity for increased educational

outcomes and successful transition into formal schooling.

Ballarat and District Aboriginal Cooperative is facilitating a project providing these early childhood education and care services in response to the needs of our community. There is increased importance of early education and insufficienct culturally-safe early learning services, causing high demand for such facilities. This project will commence with the opening of an Aboriginal-designed, managed and delivered early years' service, which includes a 100-place longdaycare, government-funded kindergarten and playgroup in Brown Hill, with a proposed opening date in early 2021.

The new Perridak Burron ELC will be at 340 - 348 Humffray Street North, Brown Hill, adjacent to the Shell Service Station, near the corner of Water Street/Daylesford Road. It will provide an increased capacity for BADAC to deliver Early Childhood Education.

This new and exciting endeavour will provide many employment opportunities and will be open for both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal children. It will become a gathering place for all of our children to grow and learn together, creating their own educational community. BADAC Playgroup will be conducted at this new centre, along with other programs.

All artwork for the Perridak Burron ELC, including the logo, has been commissioned by local Community Member, Shu Brown.

The ELC's logo is in the shape of the Platypus (Perridak in Waddawurrung language), the culturally-inspired logo has connection to water that flows across the region. The hills are drawn in various colours, representing the different hills across the region: bald gold-rich and ochre-rich hills.

The meeting place symbol being the ELC and in general the Ballarat Region as a meeting place and a diverse community for many Aboriginal People across the state and country. Footsteps representing the learning journey of the young children.

All this on the back of a platypus, the animal that is made up from lots of different animals, much like the Ballarat Aboriginal community.

From the ECKA CEO

The Brown Hill Kindergarten remains open and is continuing to provide programs for all children during the new stage 3 restrictions and all children are welcome to attend. The staff are taking many extra precautions with hygiene and cleaning practices, as well as social distancing procedures for arrival and pick up times. All children who are unwell or have any symptoms of cold or flu are required to remain at home until they are recovered.

The kindergarten children are enjoying the rich educational play-based program which is supporting them to develop positive relationships. As the children play they are learning to get along with one another, using words to communicate their needs, cooperating and resolving conflicts. Emotional competence and empathy are being developed as the children learn about the feelings, emotions and motivations of others. Play is also encouraging the development of language skills, as each child's

vocabulary grows and develops as they play together with peers and interact with adults. The kindergarten staff are supporting language development by asking questions, encouraging conversation and introducing unfamiliar words. The program is also designed to foster creativity and imagination, enabling the children to find solutions to a variety of problems they encounter. Fostering imagination at an early age is fundamental to developing curiosity and raising a generation of creative problemsolvers.

Planning for 2021 is currently underway with the Ballarat City Council commencing their process of sending out the first round of offers for a place in 2021. Parents who have registered their child for a place in 2021 will receive a letter from Council during August and September and we encourage parents to respond to the letter as soon as possible. Once again there is high demand for places at the kindergarten and we will work closely with Council throughout this process. Our normal orientation and information sessions may look different this year due to the coronavirus and we will provide information to all new families by the beginning of term 4.

From the Principal's Desk

As we pivot back to remote learning there are many challenges ahead for all of us. Children are once again required to be at home and teachers are providing learning in an unfamiliar way. Together we will work to ensure learning can occur.

In term 3 we are better prepared. That is, we have provided remote learning before and we are able to do it again. We have reflected on what was achieved in term 2, the things that worked for us and our students, and are well positioned to get moving again.

What can be done will be done.

We remain particularly concerned about the wellbeing of our students and families. The next six weeks are going to be very challenging and the amount of time kids spend on screens, the amount of time we spend isolated from friends and families and the lovely Ballarat weather keeping us indoors will make many of us feel both lonely and a little sad.

After my experience as a Dad during 'Lockdown 1.0' I know

children can withdraw and become depressed. My top tips for remote learning 2 are:

* Keep kids in a shared space as much as possible.

* Don't allow kids to spend all day isolated in their bedroom.

* Schedule family movie night and make popcorn.

* Exercise often, bike rides, scooter rides, walks, runs. Fresh air is the best.

* Keep an eye on their online use, messages and 'social medias' (if they are old enough to be on the 'social medias').

For more pleasant news, our school is about to work through some significant upgrades. Our school council has worked for many months on a number of projects and some have been completed: the renovation of the toilets, the update of the foyer, the addition of concrete pathways to keep feet dry and the purchase of new student furnishings. We have also installed three flagpoles at the entry to the school flying the Aboriginal, Torres Strait and Australian flags.

By the end of 2020 we will also have some significant landscaping completed, providing a new play space for our students and our netball and basketball courts are to be resurfaced with new

smooth-pave surface. We are just deciding on colours now! We are also resurfacing our indoor gym space and have plans for some additional classroom upgrades. Although 2020 is not going to be the year we remember fondly, we will at least get to the end of the year with our school facilities upgraded and looking fantastic!

This year has been very challenging for anyone who is at kindergarten and trying to work out where to send their children for prep. We are once again unable to provide any tours. However, we are able to take phone calls!

New Power Transmission Line Project Raises Concerns

Wattle Flat landholders along Bush Inn Road have received letters from AusNet/Mondo expressing interest in their land for construction of a new electricity transmission line known as the Western Victoria Transmission Network Project (westvictnp.com.au). The project consists of a 220kv transmission line extending from Bulgana near Stawell to an undisclosed location in the Dean district, where the line will then become a 500kv transmission line to Sydenham.

The construction of the Stawell -Dean line would see 50-60 metre high towers with a 50-70 metre easement of cleared land for the length of the line. The line of interest would pass through the Creswick forests where the required land clearing would have a devastating impact on the forest ecosystem.

The project will affect community safety, livelihoods and environments including the highconservation value areas within Wattle Flat, the Creswick Regional Park and Glen Park State Forest as well as increasing fire risk and challenges to firefighting. This transmission line could have terrible consequences for the forest and residents in Brown Hill, Nerrina, Glen Park, Pootilla, Wattle Flat, Invermay and Creswick.

A community group under the banner of Save Wattle Flat has formed to protect the people, flora and fauna of Wattle Flat and surrounds from damaging corporate infrastructure. To learn more or to get involved, go to savewattleflat.org.

Raj lives on a 15 acre farm in Sulky near Creswick, with his wife, seven-year-old son and a cricketmad mate. He works at McDonalds in Delacombe and, earlier this year, decided it was time to create his own cricket team.

Born in India, Raj says, "All we knew from our childhood was cricket. We had nothing else. It is in the blood. Since I have known anything, I know cricket."

We asked Raj if the Brown Hill Blues are going to win the next premiership and he said with a laugh, "Obviously, yes!"

Raj wants to thank the Brown Hill Cricket Club and local community for being so welcoming to his team and coming to support them during training. He says, "We would like to form a junior team, so interested players under 18 years old should get in touch."

The Brown Hill Cricket Oval is the home ground for the Brown Hill Blues, so when cricket gets started, make sure you support one of our new local teams.

A Brown Hill Gem

Have you seen this house?

Known by long-time Brown Hill residents as 'The Manse' or 'The Haunted House', it has overseen Brown Hill's rise from a ramshackle mining encampment to the thriving settled community it is now.

The Manse is a modestly-grand old house on the corner of Ryan Street and Old Melbourne Road that was built around the late 1860s or early 1870s as a parsonage for the Reverend Christopher Allanby. It sits above Brown Hill with a wonderful view over east Brown Hill. Reverend Allanby worked in the Brown Hill Parish and also as Archdeacon of the Wimmera and Loddon region for over 52 years, retiring in 1914.

The church, planned to be built on the high ground on the north side of the Manse, was never begun. Instead, a wooden church was built closer into Ballarat as the anticipated growth of the city progressed west, north and south rather than easterly. The Church was called St Mark's and was located in Humffray Street North, opposite the swimming pool. It was constructed and gazetted in 1862 and removed in 1985 and the accompanying hall was demolished. The area is now the residential 'Heritage Court'.

Archdeacon Allanby had a small road named for him, Allanby Street, which is on the bend further down Ryan Street and runs through to Bradbury Street. It is still shown on some maps of the area, but it has since fallen into disuse.

The Manse passed out of church hands in 1940 and was owned by members of the Woodward family until the mid-1990s. It was during the 1960s that the house fell derelict and gained the reputation in the area as 'haunted.'

It was bought in 2000 by Merralyn and Colin Sargent and has been lovingly restored to better than original condition. It has been extended to encompass a modern kitchen and bathroom and is now a comfortable, habitable home due in no small part to the installation of hydronic heating.

Some aspects of the old house have been lost over the years such as the cellar that was filled in when earthworks were undertaken around the house to remedy a drainage issue prior to Merralyn and Colin's ownership. They have worked hard to restore the house to its original appearance and have painstakingly sourced original fittings and fixtures in keeping with the era of the house.

Unfortunately Merralyn and Colin have had to be creative with the front of the property as despite extensive historical research there has been no photograph of this aspect of the house discovered.
