Community works together to clear the track

Wild weather lashed Victoria just before the Queen's Birthday Long Weekend, causing havoc along the Brown Hill section of the Yarrowee River Trail. Local community members worked together to clear the track.

As we all know, the wild weather of 10 and 11 June made a bit of a mess around town. The Yarrowee River Trail/Wallaby Track was not spared.

A casual walk along the trail on Friday morning revealed tons of debris on the track with sticks, branches, leaves and several trees also down.

A call to arms to the Brown Hill Progress Association (BHPA) and volunteers connected with the Saturday morning parkrun resulted in a great turn-out.

We met at 8.00 am on Saturday 12 June in the Springs Road carpark. People came loaded with rakes, brooms, shovels, clippers and blowers. The group spread out along the trail between Springs Road and the Western Freeway tunnel where most of the damage had occurred.

The whole process was checked first with the City of Ballarat and we were given the thumbs up to go ahead. They also sent a chainsaw crew down late on Friday to cut the fallen trees away from the track. After a successful

couple of hours our crew all settled back to Jenine and Mick's coffee caravan in Water Street for some refreshments.

A big thank you to all who helped and to the City of Ballarat crew who shifted all the big stuff on what must have been a very hectic and long Friday.

Brown Hill Traffic Issues

Recently, representatives from the Brown Hill Progress Associaton, Woodman's Hill Secondary College, Caledonian Primary School and local residents who had expressed concern about traffic issues in Brown Hill, were invited to attend a meeting with Juliana Addison MP and the Acting Regional Director of the Department of Transport, Angela Daraxoglou.

Of key concern was the traffic congestion along Water Street, Brown Hill, between Woodman's Hill Secondary College and Caledonian Primary School, particularly around school dropoff and pick-up times.

Both school principals attended the meeting, highlighting the need to ensure students who want to are able to safely walk, ride, scoot or skateboard to school.

Local residents in the meeting explained an associated issue, being that some vehicles

travelling along Water Street cut down either side of Caledonian Primary School to get to Humffray Street North, for an alternative route into central Ballarat. This not only increases traffic in the school zone but also adds to the already significant flow of traffic along Humffray Street North.

Kat and Jerome, Brown Hill residents said, "We are thankful for the opportunity to convey our concerns and understand that a collaborative effort is required. However, we are also eager to see some tangible progress sooner rather than later."

An immediate outcome of the meeting was to connect with the local Victoria Police to suggest additional visible presence in the area around school drop off and pick up times.

We will report on feedback from the Department of Transport when it becomes available.

Local resident Louise said, "I am grateful for the opportunity to be involved in such a robust discussion and hope that our community can get some great outcomes for local road safety."

Thank you Juliana and Angela for spending time listening to our concerns.

We sent a letter of "please explain" and our petition response to politicians both local and federal, local councillors and every level of management that we could find at Australia Post.

We have had a very good response via mail and phone calls. The most important from State and regional managers of Australia Post who have informed us about the 'Expressions of Interest for the Management and Premises for an Australia Post branch in the suburb of Brown Hill'. This advertisement appeared online and in national and local newspapers in early June. The major sticking point for the return of the service is the provision of an appropriate building to house the Post Office.

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Mineshafts

For decades, several uncovered mineshafts have lain hidden atop the hill behind the Brown Hill Reserve and Hotel. They have been covered by branches, gorse and blackberry bushes, disguising the danger only footsteps away from local walking tracks.

With the recent clearing of the Monte Cristo Parkland and the reserve up on the hill, these mineshafts have become a potential threat to the safety of children, walkers and cyclists alike, not to mention dogs and wildlife which could easily stumble into the depths and suffer serious injury or worse.

Thanks to the persistence of residents and users of the tracks, the Victorian Department of Environment, Land and Water Planning (DELWP) has recently filled in four of the largest mineshafts and have plans to return soon to cap off several smaller ones.

The issue of these shafts had been raised numerous times with the Council. The team at DELWP have been proactive and helpful, stopping to chat with local passers-by and keeping in touch with the residents who reported the issues, to keep them informed.

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Wattle Flat Pootilla Landcare Group

Community Volunteer Action Grant

In 2018 the Wattle Flat Pootilla Landcare Group secured funding for the Community Volunteer Action Grant (CVAG) as part of the State Government's Biodiversity on-ground action program.

Our aims of the grant were to:

- 1. Engage and educate the community.
- 2. Collect and map data of significant roadside vegetation in the Wattle Flat Pootilla area.
- 3. Protect and revegetate a total area of 1.5 ha along Fellmongers Creek (an important tributary to the Gong Gong Reservoir).

1. Engage and Educate

Our 'Wildflower and Eucalyptus ID' walks at Slaty Creek have been extremely well received. We have thoroughly enjoyed introducing people to the beauty of our local bush. We are hoping to continue these education sessions in the future.

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2. Significant Roadside Vegetation Assessment

Our landcare group commissioned local naturalist, Roger Thomas, to identify and document significant roadside native vegetation in the local area. He collected data on features such as tree species, health and approximate age from 15 roadsides. This data will be compiled into a document for future reference and to educate members, landholders in the area and the broader community.

3. Fellmongers Creek

This year we completed our fifth and final planting along
Fellmongers Creek, adding a whopping 3000 plants to the area overall! Michelle and her family have reported an influx of wildlife including frogs, snakes and birds. Fellmongers Creek flows directly into the Gong Gong Reservoir and the combination of plantings and stock exclusion will greatly improve the water quality and environment.

The map allows users to anonymously mark a point, tell a story or share an experience while out for leisure, sport, exercise or play.

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Brown Hill Mobile Phone Signal Survey Update

You may recall the Brown Hill Mobile Phone survey that was coordinated by the Brown Hill FireAware Network in October/November last year. The survey sought input on the strength of mobile phone signals from residents in the Springs Road and surrounding areas.

As advised in the December newsletter, we estimated there were around 350-400 houses in the area with new builds commencing every week. The survey was targeted in this area as many residents have complained about the poor or non-existent mobile signal inside and around their homes for many years. We were pleased to have 168 people complete the survey.

Some major survey outcomes were:

* 159 respondents indicated that

the mobile signal in their home was either non-existent or poor (1 bar of signal strength).

* 141 gave one of those same responses when answering about mobile signal outside their house on their property.

Its disconcerting to see that Telstra's Mobile Coverage web page (telstra.com.au/coveragenetworks/our-coverage) indicates that all of Ballarat, including the Springs Road area, has full 4G coverage. The website has a proviso (there's always an outclause) that some areas' signal may vary due to geographic features (hills, gullies etc.) or based on the phone you are using.

We believe that this poor signal issue is spread over a large area and a large number of households and needs to be publicised and addressed.

After some delay, the report will be finished by the time you are reading this newsletter. We are currently making appointments with our Local, State and Federal representatives to provide them

with a copy of the report and seek their support in lobbying for upgraded mobile signal in the affected area.

Many thanks again to all residents who took part in the survey. Also, a big thank you to Ben Harrap, a new resident in Brown Hill, who answered our request for help. Ben, with his data analysis skills, collated the survey data and wrestled the results into some very useful and understandable graphs and tables, a whole lot easier than we would have managed.

We will give a further update in the future after meeting with the various stakeholders who hopefully can assist in resolving this issue.

From the Principal's Desk

To the Brown Hill Community, I would not have predicted

another lockdown this term. It really seemed like everything was going so well! Once again we have had some disruption in the term and while a few weeks were challenging we can be proud of our staff, students and families for the manner in which they adapted.

While we all crave "normal", we are not quite there yet as the current outbreak and restrictions have shown us. This does not mean we can't continue to grow and develop!

Caledonian Primary School is experiencing significant change. We have reviewed and are in the process of redesigning the approaches we implement in writing and reading with explicit comprehension instruction and a sequential approach to the teaching of writing.

NSW Government's Centre for Education Statistics and Evaluation (CESE) reviewed all elements of the National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) and found that Year Nine writing results were one of the strongest indicators for success in Year 12, a stronger indicator than many other NAPLAN areas.

At Caledonian Primary School we recognise the importance of writing and developing the skills to communicate in print. This year we have taken significant steps to improve our practice in teaching writing at all year levels.

Although Year Nine NAPLAN may be a long way from Grade Two, we are all committed to every child's education and ensuring that our

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students are fully prepared to the best of their, and our, ability. The sense of responsibility does not end at Grade Six. We are providing the foundation to the educational opportunities for every student who comes through our doors.

Something we don't often talk about is playtime. Twice a day, totalling around five hours a week, our students spend time in play. One of the big changes this year is the amount of play equipment we are getting into the yard - balls, skipping ropes etc. We have also seen improvements to court surfaces and the fixing of multiple "mud pits" around the school.

The impact we are seeing with kids is opportunities for them to build resilience and problemsolving skills. I know it may not be ideal having your child come home covered in sand, but the cooperative play in the sandpit is wonderful. The digging of tunnels together, making tracks and imaginative games all contribute to children's development.

Kids are organising games, imaginative and sporting, with each other. Negotiating rules for certain ball games with some "robust" discussions is important. As adults we need these skills! Skipping ropes make great horse

harnesses, the rocks at the playground keep you protected from lava and tiggy over the 6.5 acres of space means it's really easy to get away!

On this topic I would like to remind our community about the Brown Hill Playgroup that operates on site here at Caledonian Primary School. Every Wednesday morning between 9.00 am and 11.00 am all babies and preschool children and their parents/carers are welcome. Being at home with young children can be an isolating experience. Playgroup can be as much for grownups as it is for the children! Cost is gold coin



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

From the Principal's desk

What appears more and more apparent to me, as I develop as a principal, is that everything we do in schools is an investment in our own future.

When I look back on my own time at school, and, granted, often through rose-tinted spectacles, life seemed a lot simpler then with challenges that did not seem so overwhelming. There may have been limited choices but the world seemed to move at a pace that was easier to keep up with and it felt that there was greater certainty and stability.

The world of our current students seems light-years away from those simpler times and I marvel at their capacity to be agents of change. From the environment to equality, from the Arts to Science Technology Engineering and Maths (STEM), we have some fierce leaders who are prepared to stand up for what they believe in. Whilst any positive movement for change requires its leaders, of equal importance are those who stand by their side and support them.

At Woodmans Hill Secondary
College, we have a thriving school
leadership program that is
providing a wide range of
opportunities for students to
change hearts and minds and help
their school be the type of school
of which they can feel proud to
belong. Whilst we have had strong
leadership banging the drum for
positive change, we have had our



whole school get behind them to offer support.

Woodmans Hill students are incredibly socially aware and are prepared to fight for a world that is accepting of others; that understands that we are all different but the same... our students want to come to a school that is compassionate and caring. The events our students have organised in this first half of the year have been inspiring and have mobilised their community to make a stand regarding topics that matter to them.

Highlights so far have been every member of our school community who identifies as female gathering on the oval to celebrate International Women's Day. Another stand-out moment was the whole school (wearing the colours of the rainbow) gathering together for IDAHOBIT Day#- the international day to stand against LGBTQIA+ discrimination.

Both of these events were nominated and planned for by our students and reflect their deep commitment for equality for all. I am so proud to lead a school in which its students are prepared to make a difference on behalf of others and who insist that we create a world in which no one has

to feel victimised for who they are. It is important to have leaders who can inspire but there is real power when a whole community comes together and stands as one.

Term Three will see student voices become more vocal, with our Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) students combining with our First Nations students to run five days of events to celebrate NAIDOC Week*. Although NAIDOC Week falls within the school holidays, our students and staff felt the passionate need to acknowledge the importance of embracing First Nations' cultural knowledge and understanding of Country. For our community, NAIDOC Week is seen as part of Australia's national heritage and an opportunity to equally respect the culture and values of Aboriginal peoples and Torres Strait Islanders, as we do the cultures and values of all Australians.

This term, all staff completed CUST (Cultural Understanding and Safety Training) and under the guidance of our First Nations School Leader (Trish Fox) we aim to raise cultural awareness and levels of cultural safety at Woodmans Hill so that we can move forward as one community.

The school continues to improve its facilities and we are really excited about finding ways to create a better learning environment for our students. Unlike many other high schools, Woodmans Hill has not benefited from a significant financial investment, so we need to be creative and do the very best with what we have. The recent installation of solar panels to enable us to move towards greater

sustainability is a concrete example of investing in our future. However, the thing that will provide the greatest return in the future will be our investment in our students for they have the capacity to change our world for the better.

Ballarat Sewer Build is making progress

Ballarat's two largest sewer lines, Ballarat East and Ballarat South, were constructed almost 100 years ago and have provided a lasting legacy for our regional city. However, these sewer lines are approaching capacity and require upgrading to support Ballarat's growth for generations to come.

The Central Highlands Water (CHW) Ballarat Sewer Build is a \$25 million community infrastructure project that will duplicate these sewer lines. Over the next three to five years, the project will lay the foundation for another 100 years of wastewater service delivery to our current and future population.

Approximately 6 km of sewer pipe will be installed from Ballarat East to Ballarat South, parallel to the existing sewer. Minor repairs and pipe relining will also be

conducted on the original sewer, which will continue to operate.

Construction of Stage 1: CBD to White Flat Oval commenced in April. Stage 1 consists of approximately 1 km of pipeline being constructed through the CBD from Mair Street (south side of the rail line) along Peel Street, Eastwood Street and Anderson Street East and West, before connecting into the Ballarat South sewer system near White Flat Oval.

Ballarat Sewer Build Project Manager, Michael Dwyer, acknowledged the history of the original project and the necessity of the new sewer, saying, "The original sewer construction was built under extenuating circumstances and the sacrifices made to achieve the project were significant. The original sewer has performed beyond expectations but with Ballarat's current growth we need to improve the sewer and increase its size and therefore capacity, so it can service our community for another 100 years."

CHW is committed to keeping

construction impacts to a minimum and supporting businesses, residents and the community at every stage of the Ballarat Sewer Build.

Did you know...

- * A major objective of the project was to support community health, preventing plagues experienced by cities such as London. Later, the Spanish Flu was front of mind.
- * Construction commenced on 6 December 1922 with the first Ballarat house connected to the system on 1 July 1925.
- * Described as "boosting Ballarat", this key project employed locals, including returned servicemen and tradesmen, as well as orphans who gained apprenticeships.
- * Workers' conditions were wellnegotiated, capped at 44 hours per week. A 'well-paid' worker could receive the equivalent of \$3 per week.
- * Since the original project, Ballarat's population has soared from 22,000 to 117,000. The original works performing beyond expectations, lasting a century and servicing a 430% population growth.
