Norma's Brown Hill

In 1887, Francis Wilson established Wilson's Orchard in Brown Hill[1]. 130 years later, Wilson's Fruit and Vegetables is still going strong. A member of Brown Hill's Wilson family was interviewed by Caledonian Primary School students.

Mrs Norma Moulten (nee Wilson) grew up here in Brown Hill. She attended two primary schools in Ballarat, one of which was Brown Hill Primary School which we now call Caledonian.

As a schoolgirl, she was terribly afraid of the dentist (and still is today). The dentist would come into the school every two years.

They would also get milk delivered to the school. When she went to school here she also happened to be the school captain. "A lot has changed," she says, "but it is still a wonderful and beautiful school."

After high school, Mrs Moulten went on to work at 'Lucas', a first class clothing store, where she made beautiful clothes. It was situated where 'Target' is now. Mrs Moulten then went on to pursue her dream of being a nurse at the St John of God Hospital, in the sterilizing department.

Before she was married, she used to go to the fruit market with her Dad and would help in the orchard before and after school. They grew fruit and vegetables which they tied up with twine. Every Monday, Wednesday and Thursday they went to the market to sell the produce. They grew a lot of parsnips and carrots.

Defibrillator in the Brown Hill Hall

Following a discussion at the May Brown Hill Partnership meeting, there is now a life-saving defibrillator installed at the Brown Hill Public Hall. The unit is part of the lifeguard equipment at the Brown Hill Community Pool, provided by the City of Ballarat. It normally sits idle over the 39 weeks during which the pool is unused. Through a collaboration between the pool and hall committees, the unit is now fitted on the wall of the middle room between the main hall and the kitchen. Hopefully, the

defibrillator will not have to be used. However, if need be, it is now available all year round, either at the pool during pool season (usually December to early March) or the hall outside pool season (usually early March-November). A big thanks to Ian Fullerton from the Brown Hill Progress Association for relocating the unit into the hall.

The discussion around this small project highlighted the lack of a unit being available to the wider public in the main shopping strip of Brown Hill over a wider range of hours. Future meetings may look at a system similar to that in Buninyong, where a defibrillator is now housed at the local service station in the centre of town. We will keep people posted as to future changes.

REMEMBER: A **000** call and continuous CPR are the first vital steps in any emergency victim collapse situation.



Kindergarten Open Day

Kindergarten Enrolment

The City of Ballarat's Central Kindergarten Enrolment Scheme is an initiative to ensure the general public has access to an equitable and timely system for processing kindergarten enrolments. The centralised system replaces individual applications and endeavours to secure a place at the preferred centre.

Children may be enrolled in the year they turn two. Families may submit an enrolment form with three preferences for participating kindergartens and are encouraged to visit kindergartens before nominating their preferences.

Children attending four-year-old kindergarten in 2018 must turn four before 30 April 2018. Children attending 'pre-kinder' are able to attend after they turn three, if places are available.

Applications for four-year-old kindergarten and pre-kinder (three-year-old) in 2018 close **Friday 30 June, 2017**.

First round offers for places in 2018 will be sent out in the first week of August. Applicants are encouraged to respond to their offer as detailed in the letter. Second round offers will also be sent in August, with final round offers in early September 2017.

Tree Planting

Brown Hill Kindergarten children will participate in tree-planting activities with City of Ballarat staff on Tuesday 20 June and Thursday 22 June. Tree-planting has become an annual activity for the kindergarten, with many of the children who will participate this year having older siblings who planted other trees in the area when they were at kindergarten.

The kindergarten has a bush-kinder programme where the children spend one session per week in the bush/parkland alongside the Yarrowee River behind the kindergarten. At bush-kinder, they have the opportunity to spend long periods of time in the natural environment. The programme aims to foster independence, resilience and a connection with and appreciation of the local natural environment.

Brown Hill Kindergarten also values links with, and a connection to, the local community, including people, places and services. The tree-

planting activities support both the bush-kinder programme and the kindergarten's connection with the community. Through their involvement in the tree-planting, the children have an interest in and ownership of the local bushland and feel a connection with the areas they have helped plant. Many children consistently revisit the area to check on the progress and growth of the trees.

The children work with City of Ballarat staff to plant the trees. The City of Ballarat staff share their knowledge of local plants and the environment. John shares his collection of bird nests, gathered over a period of time and, this year, Daniel will be sharing his knowledge about spiders.

Autumn Delights along the Yarrowee

After the success of our March frog survey and botanical drawing class, we ran another round. As the weather was a bit dubious, the kind owners of the Brown Hill Pub let us sit out on the back balcony to conduct the botanic drawing class from where we could overlook the vegetation and still have great natural light.

As the drizzle continued into the evening, we got more excited as it was shaping up to be perfect frogfinding conditions. We were joined by local herpetologist (frog expert) Ray Radford, who has been studying frogs for many decades. He enlightened us with a small portion of his knowledge. We then headed down for a walk around the Nerrina wetlands, where we heard a cacophony of frogs, including the autumn-breeding and not-so-commonly-heard Victorian Smooth Froglet. Then the true magic began as we started spotting frogs hopping across the pathways and along the vegetation. Everyone excitedly turned on their torches and there was a lot of, "Over here, check this out!" being called out. The frogs really put on a great show and everyone went home a little wet

The following Sunday, we started at the other end of the day to search for a different variety of creatures in our Brunch with Brown Hill Birds event. A group of 20 people, including some Birdlife Australia enthusiasts, braved the early Sunday morning chill to enjoy a walk along the Yarrowee River and through Ditchfield Reserve to enjoy the songs, colours and flight patterns of 22 species of local birds. There was particular excitement at the sighting of the Flame Robin with its striking red breast. A big thanks to the Birdlife Australia

volunteers for their time on the day. We finished the morning off with a picnic brunch over discussions of all our great sightings.

One Humanity Shower Bus

Fr. Constantine from St. Paul's Anglican Church in Ballarat spoke at the Brown Hill Uniting Church's April Men's Breakfast about the 'One Humanity Shower Bus' project.

He posed the question, "How would you deal with not knowing where your next shower was coming from?" This sobering thought is a harsh reality for our city's homeless. These are mums and their children, young people and many others who sleep rough each night in our city. Fr. Constantine said that, "for each of us, as part of humanity, it is essential to open our hearts and eyes to see that if one person suffers, we all suffer. The One Humanity group is a 100% community volunteer organisation that believes we should all do what we can to ease that suffering."

The 'One Humanity Shower Bus Project' has as its guiding principle a foundation of ensuring dignity and hope to homeless people in our city through the provision of hygiene services. This is offered in an accepting and safe way to lift the spirits of individuals and, in turn, of the whole community.

The bus has started operating on Fridays and Sundays (6.00pm-8.00pm). It has two showers, wash basins and storage areas. There are plans to add a washing machine and dryer later. The bus will operate from White Flat Oval (Moyle and Hickman Streets) where Fr. Constantine says, "our brothers and sisters sleeping rough are welcome to come and use its services."

The project is funded by community donations. One Humanity Shower Bus Inc. was successful in its 'Foundation for Rural and Regional Renewal Application' (FRRR), which allows it to receive tax-deductible donations.

John Basson Humffray

Many of us have travelled down Humffray Street in Brown Hill, but how many of us know about the man behind the name?

John Basson Humffray was born in Newtown, Wales, in 1824. He travelled to Australia in 1853, leaving behind his practice as a solicitor to chase the dream of finding gold.

He began making history in 1854 by making public speeches on behalf of the Ballarat Reform League about the political system in Ballarat and Victoria at the time. This time was pretty terrible for the diggers on the local goldfields because most of them couldn't afford regular necessities, let alone paying for a mining licence. John Humffray wanted the diggers to be recognised and represented in government.

In the Eureka Rebellion, Humffray chose not to involve himself in the fighting but rather to represent the diggers later. After the rebellion, he was elected to represent electorates in and around Ballarat. In 1860, he was selected as the Minister for Mines.

Humffray represented Ballarat proudly for many years, but after a long time he lost his money and died in 1891.






