The Brown Hill Community has yet again provided a great variety of articles for you to read in this edition.

We have many reasons to celebrate in Brown Hill, with \$380,000 being invested in Stage One of the Brown Hill Public Hall refurbishment (p.6), a Local Area Plan underway (p.6), a First Aid course on offer (p.5) and an 'exceedingly good' local kindergarten (p.9).

The 2016 Census data has been released and Brown Hill statistics have been summarised by Molly from Woodman's Hill (p.4). A few additional facts about Brown Hill in 2016:

*There were 3,582 people. Of these 49% were male and 51% were female. Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people made up 1.5% of the population.

*There were 1,543 dwellings. Of all households, 69% were family households, 27% were single person households and 4% were group households. Of occupied private dwellings, 29% were owned outright, 42% were owned with a mortgage and 26% were rented.

*20% of households had a weekly

household income of less than \$650 and 11% of households had a weekly income of more than \$3000.

Please note, percentages have been rounded for ease of reading.

Tiana raises awareness

Hi. My name is Tiana Collins. I am 11 years old. I did a presentation at school to raise awareness of Huntington's Disease in May.

Huntington's Disease (HD) affects

me personally. My Pa and his brother have both recently been diagnosed with it. It's a genetic disease. There is currently no cure for HD, but there are some treatments that can help to ease certain symptoms, which is why I wanted people to understand and donate if they could to Huntington's Victoria. It isn't a well known disease.

There are three groups of symptoms: physical, cognitive and personality (emotions). My family have it all, which is really sad and hard to watch. From the beginning of the symptoms, doctors predict people with HD can live for about 15 more years.

Both of my family members are getting worse and sometimes really struggle with normal life. As it is genetic, my dad might have HD. If he does, my brother, sister and I might too. It's a 50% chance one way or the other.

Life is challenging with Huntington's Disease, it takes your life as you know it and becomes a fight every day.

Brown Hill Snapshot


The recent Census undertaken by the Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) has provided a wide variety of statistics and information about just who and what makes up our Brown Hill community.

We can all see that Brown Hill is growing and changing. However, what do these changes mean for the make-up of our suburb?

In many ways, Brown Hill mirrors the average Australian community. However, there are some important statistics that show how we are changing.

Our population age demographics show that the Brown Hill population is above the Australian average in the 25-29 and 30-34 age brackets. We also have a higher than average amount of young children (0-9 years). This could reflect that more and more young families are finding Brown Hill an attractive location in which to raise their families.

One reason why our suburb could be more attractive to young families is the affordability of both rental and mortgaged properties. In both instances, properties in




Brown Hill are significantly more affordable than national and, indeed, state averages. The median weekly rent in Brown Hill is \$250, compared to averages of \$325 in Victoria and \$335 nationally. With regards to homes for purchase, the average monthly mortgage in Brown Hill is \$1482; a big saving when compared to amounts of \$1728 in Victoria and \$1755 nationally.

The majority of residents in Brown Hill are Australian-born (88%), with European countries making up the majority of other countries of birth. England and Scotland were second and third highest on the list, respectively. The residents of Brown Hill don't identify as a very religious community, with 35% of residents identifying as having no religious affiliations, which is higher than the national average. However, of those who are religious, Brown Hill has a higher percentage of people identifying as Catholic, compared to the national average.

To demonstrate the giving nature of our residents, we show a higher than average percentage of people who give their time to undertake voluntary work through a group or organisation (22% compared to 19% nationally), as well as people who provide unpaid assistance to a person with a disability (13% compared to 11% nationally).

Chain of Survival



The defibrillator at Brown Hill Hall

With the recent temporary relocation of a defibrillator from the Brown Hill Pool into the Brown Hill Hall (until the Pool Season starts), there has been much discussion about teaching people in our community how to use a defibrillator.

After reading the defibrillator article in Edition 7 of the newsletter, Scott Angove, the Community Educator Grampians & Loddon Mallee for Ambulance Victoria got in touch with the Brown Hill Progress Association. He wrote:

"Ambulance Victoria has recently released statistics showing that more bystanders than ever are stepping in to help save lives if they see someone collapse in cardiac arrest. The latest Victorian Ambulance Cardiac Arrest Registry (VACAR) Annual Report, found a record 64 per cent of onlookers attempted CPR if they witnessed someone collapse in cardiac arrest, up from only 35 per cent in 2005-06. It also found bystanders used Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) on patients in a shockable rhythm 70 times in 2014-15, a sixfold increase on the 10 times AEDs were used in 2005-06.

If you receive CPR from someone in the community, you are nearly twice as likely to survive as if a paramedic delivered CPR first. Same with a defibrillator. If you are fortunate to have early defibrillation, you are twice as likely to survive if defibrillation was done by a paramedic.

Based on these fantastic results, it is essential we continue to educate community members so they have the knowledge and capacity to support their local community in responding to a medical emergency."

Ambulance Victoria run free-ofcharge 'Chain of Survival' sessions to educate community members about recognising a medical emergency, calling Triple Zero (000) and CPR and defibrillator awareness. The Brown Hill Progress Association is working with Ambulance Victoria to make these sessions available in Brown Hill. Information will be made available in future editions of the newsletter, on the Brown Hill Community Online Hub: brownhill.vic.au and on the 'Making Brown Hill' Facebook page.

Hall Refurbishment

Significant funding for the refurbishment of the Brown Hill Public Hall has been granted. The Brown Hill Partnership has allocated \$100.000 and the Brown Hill Hall Committee has committed \$10,000. The City of Ballarat will invest \$270,000. Precise planning will begin shortly, coordinated by the City of Ballarat, with hopes of beginning Stage 1 early in 2018. Grants for Community Groups

The City of Ballarat's Community Impact Grant Program is open for applications.

Local not-for-profit organisations, associations and community groups planning a project or activity in the municipality of Ballarat are encouraged to apply to Council's Community Impact Grant Program for funding to assist with the delivery of these.

Up to \$10,000 is available for projects that:

*develop partnerships with the community

*provide sustainable opportunities for participants

*projects where the grant money assists in either the implementation of projects or activities; or

*funding for non-fixed capital items and equipment

The grant program encourages applicants to be innovative, creative and address need within their community. This Community Impact Grant Program is open in four rounds, with programs to be placed on hold when funds are fully allocated.

Round One opened on 1 August and **closes on 31 August**.

Scott Parade Improvement Project

Phase One of the Scott Parade Improvement Project has been completed with the uplifting of trees and tidying up of garden beds.

Phase Two of the project will include rejuvenation of existing garden beds, with the planting of tube stock and spreading of mulch. Four new garden beds will be constructed along Scott Parade (from Water Street to Stawell Street). These beds will be planted out with native grasses. This work is scheduled to be commenced in September 2017.

All of the students were split up into groups. We had many different activities including making slime, cottage cheese, volcanic eruptions, floating sultanas and lots of other things. Overall, everyone really enjoyed it!

On Tuesday, the Grade Three and Four students got to see one of the 'Nao' (pronounced "now") robots. It danced and showed them what engineers and scientists do and what they want robots to do in the future. They got to see what a real robot looks like and how it could help humans one day! On Wednesday and Thursday, the Grade Three to Six students walked to Woodmans Hill, a campus of Ballarat Secondary College, to conduct more experiments! They got to do chemistry. After the delicious food they went straight back to the activities. Physics was another activity at Woodmans Hill. In physics they made catapults that sling-shot ping-pong balls.

Edible gardens

Growing your own vegetables might seem overwhelming, but it's much easier than you think. Also, food grown at home always tastes better. Central Highlands Water has a handy planting guide designed to make it easier for you to plan out your garden each season.

Seeds should generally be sown at the beginning/middle of each season so they have time to establish.

Winter

Broccoli, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Jerusalem Artichoke, Kale, Lettuce, Onions, Pea, Rhubarb, Strawberry, Turnip.

Spring

Asparagus, Beetroot, Broccoli, Brussels Sprouts, Cabbage, Capsicum, Carrot, Celery, Chilli, Chives, Eggplant, Leek, Lettuce, Parsley, Parsnip, Pea, Potato, Radish, Silver Beet, Spring Onion, Strawberry, Sunflower, Tomato, Turnip.

Kirk's Reservoir

On 11 January 1861, John Kirk sold his dam to the Government of Victoria, laying the foundation for the future Ballarat water supply system. In June 1862, the Kirks Dam formed the foundation of Ballarat's first permanent water supply. It has a capacity of 400 megalitres.

As one of the regions most exotic gardens, Kirks Reservoir Park is Central Highlands Water's most picturesque asset. Just east of Brown Hill (along Ballarat-Daylesford Road, past Brewery Tap Road), the park has ample parking, free undercover BBQs and toilet facilities.

The rotunda and surrounding gardens are ideal for wedding ceremonies (free, bookings required) and there are excellent learning opportunities for children and school groups to find out about the importance of water



*We get busy with the other things we need to do and don't make it a priority.


*The news media has scared us about being outside.

Vale John "Kelly" Thurling

28.03.1930 - 18.06.2017

On 18 June, at the age of 87, Kelly passed peacefully at Nazareth House, Ballarat, surrounded by his loving family.

Kelly was the loved husband of Heather for 64 years, dearly-loved father of Cheryl, Diane and Vicki, loving Pop of Angela and Matthew, Troy and Sarah, and Dale and Kasey, and special loved Poppy to Zach, Oliver, Ned and Max.

The Thurling family would like to thank everyone who attended the service at Brown Hill Uniting Church on 23 June 2017. It was a great testament to the kind, welcoming man Kelly was.

Many Brown Hill Uniting Church members reminisced that, during his time as a member, Kelly was there to welcome everyone and made each person feel at home from the first day they arrived. He would never forget a name and always remembered the last conversation he had with you, no matter how long it was since you last spoke. He loved everyone in their humanness, in their fallibility, in their realness.

Kelly was a joiner at his shop 'JB Thurling Joinery' (later known as Mathersons after Kelly sold it) on the corner of Water and Thompson Streets (across Thompson Street from Caledonian Primary School). The building is no longer there. He later moved on to run woodwork classes for children with disabilities at Pennyweight Park in Canadian.

When he finally retired, Kelly moved to Portarlington with his wife, Heather. Before their move, Kelly was involved with the Brown Hill Uniting Church as a 'greeter', Council member, Kids' Club leader and toy-maker. Many Brown Hill children of the 1980s went home with a foot stool and wooden toys made with Kelly's help. Even up to Kelly's last days, he was still thinking of new projects to start.

We also remember fondly Kelly's love of cooking; his Sunday roasts, sausage rolls, cream horns and prize-winning scones, which he was always happy to share with everyone, will be sadly missed.

Kelly, you had a smile for everyone, you had a heart of gold, you left behind the memories that everyone will hold.
