On the way home from the 2017 Brown Hill Community Festival, Brown Hill Kindergarten student, Lenny, said to his mum that he had enjoyed "the best day of my life!" What an accolade!

The second community festival, held on Friday 27 October, certainly was a wonderful evening. We saw an increase in numbers compared to the inaugural event in 2016, with the crowd being estimated at 800 to 1000 people. The 'Sausage Index' increased from 600 in 2016 to 700 in 2017, which is a strong indicator of a bigger crowd! Altogether, community activities made a profit of \$1253.50, which will be invested across groups in Brown Hill. Feedback included: "What a great community festival run by amazing volunteers," (Jane) and "Awesome job! Such a great vibe at the festival." (Bridget).

Entertainment on the festival stage was opened by the Woodman's Hill Stage Band, which was followed by a welcome from Mayor Cr Samantha McIntosh and an acknowledgement of country from Ms Alice Barnes on behalf of the Brown Hill Partnership. We also had heart-warming performances from the Brown Hill Kindergarten children and Caledonian Primary School students. New to the stage this year were the Ballarat Highland

Reader feedback

Hi Community Newsletter Team,

I am a volunteer at 99.9 Voice FM and a former Brown Hill resident, so I was interested to glance through some copies of your newsletter that had been left at the station.

I found the article about the Brown Hill Police Station in your latest edition quite interesting. After moving from Coburg at the very end of 1955, my brother and I attended Brown Hill State School from the first day of the 1956 school year. I attended until 1958, and then started at Ballarat East High School on what Don McLean would later call "The Day The Music Died" (3 February 1959), with my brother following two years later.

When we first attended the state school, we used to catch Barry Wilkins' ("Wilkins' Eastern Busways") bus to and from the corner of Humffray and Thompson Streets and I can remember the police station opposite the church. I seem to recall that it had a well-faded "Swallow's Ice Cream" sign painted directly onto the brickwork on the western wall. From memory, the lettering was white (or possibly silver) on a dark blue background. Swallow's Ice Cream was made by Swallow & Ariell, who still made biscuits in the late 1950s, but had discontinued their ice cream some years earlier.

FireAware

Summer is quickly heating up – are you prepared?

Did you know that homes have been lost from things as simple as embers landing on a doormat, creating enough fuel to burn down the front door?

Taking a bit of time in the lead-up to the hot, dry, windy days can make a big difference even if you plan to leave early in the event of a fire in the area. If you know a bad day is coming, here are some easy things you can do to reduce fuel around your home and increase the chances of it surviving.

* Remove doormats

* Store away combustible outdoor furniture/other items from decks around or under your home, especially near windows and doors, as these are the most vulnerable parts of your home

* Move pot plants a few metres from your home

* Mow your lawns

* Remove build up of fine fuels leaves and twigs (this will probably be where embers will land)

* Check your gutters, make sure leaves haven't built up

* Make sure trees are healthy with

no dead limbs and no vegetation underneath them

* Make sure you've sealed under your house to stop embers entering

Redevelopment Project

At the Brown Hill Community Partnership meeting on Tuesday 7 November, this update was presented:

*Preliminary plans have been prepared and approved by the Brown Hill Hall Redevelopment Reference Group, these plans are now with the architect.

*The extension of the building will encroach on land owned by the State Government. In-principle approval has been given with some provisions. The City of Ballarat is now waiting on formal advice.

*The work on the Hall will be put to tender.

*The project is to be completed by 30 June 2018, with minimal disruption to user groups.

At the meeting, requests were made to consider:

1. an external power connection;

2. access to water from the outside of the building.

Brown Hill Partnership

At the November meeting of the Brown Hill Community partnership, the final investment decisions were made. Over the past two years, \$200,000 of funding from the City of Ballarat has been allocated to projects across Brown Hill. Projects include the community newsletter, online hub, community festival, FireAware program, hall redevelopment, the 'Connecting to Nearby Nature' project, upgrades to the Russell Square kitchen, Brown Hill Cricket clubrooms and Caledonian Primary School multi-purpose hall and several more. Ballarat East Local Area Plan

In 2015, the City of Ballarat began a conversation with the community about how to better manage change in Ballarat East through a new Local Area Plan. During this process, the area defined as Ballarat East included the suburbs of Bakery Hill, Ballarat East, Eureka, Golden Point, Mount Pleasant and part of Canadian. It was also defined to include the part of Brown Hill west of the Western Freeway.

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Nature Play Day

Spring has seen another flurry of events along the Yarrowee in Brown Hill. The Yarrowee Leigh Catchment Group has been delighted by the children's enthusiasm for, and involvement in, the 'Connecting to Nearby Nature' project.

On Wednesday 9 August, the Yarrowee Leigh Catchment Group transported six classes of children from grades one to four at Caledonian Primary School to see a section of the Yarrowee downstream from their school. The aim was to reinforce that everything which happens at the top of the catchment in Brown Hill affects the rest of the waterway.

At the Yuille Wetlands in Sebastopol, the students engaged in two activities; 'Fantastic Frogs' and 'Waterbug Discovery'. They walked through the wetlands and were able to hear frogs and sample live waterbugs.

A month later, children from Little Bendigo Primary School in Nerrina attended the same site where they learnt all about local food webs through an interactive game. They also discovered some of our amazing waterbugs, such as the Damselfly, that breathes through the gills on its three tails!

Connection to nature occurs in children's formative years, so on Wednesday 15 November, Jane Bevelander, Environment Officer, ran a nature-play session for preschoolers, particularly members of Caledonian Playgroup. The group of 30 children (and their parents/carers) explored local nature and its creatures by the

Yarrowee in Brown Hill. This was done through a variety of tools and activities that gave the children opportunities to explore in their own way. Whether it was looking at bark through a magnifying glass or creating creatures out of sticks and gum nuts. This project has been funded through the City of Ballarat's Engaging Communities Program and we are excited to announce that the Brown Hill Partnership Group approved another \$5800 to run more events along the Brown Hill section of the Yarrowee River in 2018! Activities will include a repeat of the very popular evening frog walk and survey, and the bird walk and talk event. It will also include school excursions and nature-play sessions with the Brown Hill Kindergarten and Caledonian Primary School. Stay tuned and get involved! Brown Hill Kindergarten

We have had a very busy term at Brown Hill Kindergarten. We have participated in several joint activities with students from Caledonian Primary School, as well as visiting Phoenix College in Sebastopol for a puppet show put on by the Year 7 drama class. We had our end of year concert in the multi-purpose room at Caledonian Primary School.

Lego Robotics

In October, six students from Caledonian Primary School (including some who used to go to Brown Hill Kindergarten) visited us to show the children how they build robots with Lego and program them to move. The school students had participated in competitions in Ballarat and Melbourne with the Lego robots. The kindergarten children were fascinated and asked lots of questions. Many of them are now very keen to save up enough money to have their own set of Lego robotics!

Back to Bush Kinder

The kindergarten's 'Bush Kinder' program started in 2012. In early November, ten Caledonian Primary School students, who are currently in Grade Five and were the first group to go to bush kinder in Brown Hill, came back to visit. They joined with the kindergarten's 'Yellow' group to spend some time at bush kinder. The kindergarten children buddied up with the school students to walk to the site along the Yarrowee and to explore. The school children were very excited to see aspects of the bush kinder site that they remembered and to



find things they didn't remember. The kindergarten children were proud to show them around 'their' bush kinder. The school students climbed trees, played hide and seek, looked for bugs and had a great time. The kindergarten children were amazed at how high the older children could climb and loved playing games with them.

Following on from connections made through the Brown Hill Partnership Group, the Kindergarten children joined Brown Hill Cricket Club players for cricket activities on the Brown Hill Oval at the end of November. We played catching games and relays with the balls and running games and relays with the bats. It was a very hot day and we needed to have lots of drinks of water. Some children already participate in 'Milo Cricket' and others really like to play cricket, but it was good for everyone to learn some new skills.

School transition visits

As part of the kindergarten's 'transition to school' activities each year, the children participate in an excursion to Caledonian Primary School. This year, the Prep teachers, Mrs. Kate and Mrs P., along with past students, hosted the tour. The kindergarten children were intrigued to see the art room, library, office, sick bay, toilets and lots of classrooms. A highlight was getting to play in the playground. Having a good look at the multi-purpose hall was

especially important as that was where we were to hold our end-ofyear concert.

The visit to the primary school is valuable for all the children moving to prep in 2018, not just those attending Caledonian Primary School next year. It gives the children a chance to look at facilities and equipment they might find at school. Back at kindergarten, we talked about what we saw and compared and discussed what other schools might have and how these things might be used. This is a way to prepare the children for their move to school. On the school visits, the children were excited to see their siblings, some of their friends who came to bush kinder or others who demonstrated the Lego robotics.

The walk to the school was also a good opportunity for the kindergarten children to talk about and practise safe pedestrian behaviour and to do some mapping of the route to and from the kindergarten.





They were married at St Alipius Church on Easter Monday, 23 April 1962, by Rev. Father Brendan Davey. Their reception was held at Lester House in Sturt Street. After a honeymoon in Adelaide they returned and had rooms at 99 Victoria Street, which is now the Victoria Street Shopping Centre. Mum worked at the newly opened RACV branch on the corner of Sturt and Doveton Streets. Dad

worked as a postie.

In February 1963, their first child Mary was stillborn – it was a very sad time. Soon afterwards they moved to a house in Water Street. On 16 November 1966, Stephen was born and passed away on Christmas day that year at the Royal Children's Hospital in Melbourne – another sad time. Tony was born on 16 May 1968 and because of lack of room our family moved to Daylesford Road (which is now part of the Western Highway bypass). Their last child Chris arrived on 5 May 1975. Many happy times and wonderful childhood memories of big birthday parties and Christmas celebrations and, of course, Mum always had the camera out!

Mum played tennis with the St Alipius Tennis Club. Until recently she was still involved in the Planned Giving Campaign assembling and sending out envelopes.


