Fifteen Trees and The Villa Orchard

Fifteen Trees and St Francis Xavier Primary School: Building thriving relationships blossomed through environmental change.

Recently, we had the honour of interviewing Colleen Filippa, founder of Fifteen Trees, an organisation that plants trees to reduce companies' and individuals' carbon footprint. Colleen, based in Brown Hill, started Fifteen Trees nine years ago and, within these short nine years, the company has spread Australia-wide and even to New

Zealand.

Colleen, an environmentallymindful educator with a passion for creating long-lasting environmental change, first had the idea for Fifteen Trees as she dreamt of improving her local environment. In the early days of Fifteen Trees, Colleen set about to find community groups and schools to help her plant and care for the trees. Her own sons having attended St Francis Xavier Primary School; it was one of the early schools with which she connected.

Over the past nine years, with the help of Fifteen Trees, our school

has planted over 2000 native trees in our picturesque 20-acre setting. Part of our grounds was previously used for farming and the local environment was cleared. As part of our 'Environmental Education' program, we discovered the importance of biodiversity and wished to revegetate this land. With the help of Colleen and local businesses, we have been able to successfully do just that.

Last year, Fifteen Trees helped us to continue to follow our dreams and we created 'The Villa Orchard'. Brian and Maree of

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Harrison Funerals donated 40 mature fruits trees which we planted on the edge of our 'Perma Patch' to create a beautiful orchard.

Together, Fifteen Trees and St Francis Xavier Primary School have created a carbon-neutral natural wonderland where biodiversity flourishes. Longlasting, thriving relationships and environmental change like this are only possible when someone brave enough follows their dreams. We thank Colleen for being such a great role-model by following her dreams. We also thank those who already act for environmental change and encourage local businesses to reach out to Colleen and help us revegetate our local schools, parks, creeks and homes, one tree at a time!



Out of the Blue

A message from Police Pro-Active Unit

We asked our local Ballarat Police if they had some messages for the Brown Hill community.

Police attending burglaries on properties are still seeing firearms being stolen due to non-compliant storage options. Firearm owners are reminded to take all reasonable precautions to ensure their firearms are kept safe and do not come into the possession of a person who is not authorised to possess the weapon.

Securing firearms in storage that is compliant with licensing requirements will help prevent removal by thieves. Practice all the basic burglary and theft prevention techniques, such as locking all of your doors and windows. Consider using hardened steel padlocks, shackle protectors and chains on areas where firearms are stored.

If you see people loitering in or around rural properties and believe they are up to no good:

1. Record descriptions, e.g., height, build, clothing, & distinctive features – tattoos.

2. Vehicle details, e.g., registration numbers, colour, make, model and

3. Ring 000 immediately for police assistance.

Our Local Area Plan

Brown Hill Local Area Plan and Infrastructure Assessment follows on from the community-led City of Ballarat Engaging Communities Program.

An online survey collecting thoughts about Brown Hill was completed by 41 p eople between mid-April and early June. Results will be collated by the consultant team and integrated into the framework plan.

On Tuesday 29 May, the first of the Brown Hill Local Area Plan Community Working Group sessions was held at Caledonian Primary School. A group of 30 people, mostly residents and some business owners, gathered for a couple of hours to discuss the things that are important to them about Brown Hill. The Council-run session gave participants the opportunity to identify the issues that concern them and their aspirations for Brown Hill's future.

Rebecca Finn from Tract, a consultancy firm engaged by

Council, gave a presentation about their initial findings but reiterated that this session was really focused around listening to the community. Max Hardy, a facilitator and part of the consultant team, led the group through an exercise where participants imagined they were showing friends through Brown Hill in the year 2028. The detailed itineraries highlighted the imagined new and improved parts of the community, in addition to emphasising those parts of Brown Hill that should not change.

The Local Area Plan and Infrastructure Assessment will be a blueprint for the future of Brown Hill – an integrated and holistic land-use and frameworkplan to guide local development and infrastructure provision.

The Brown Hill community had the opportunity to join the Working Group earlier this year. The second Community Working Group session will be held at the end of July. There will also be opportunity for broader community input as the project progresses in the second half of this year.

Online updates

The Brown Hill Hall website has been moved over to the Brown Hill Community Online Hub: brownhill.vic.au/hall/

Refurbishment

The Brown Hill Hall refurbishment will be underway once Council approves the preferred contractor. The project is scheduled to take place between July and December 2018.


During the works, existing Hall bookings will continue. However, due to the uncertainty of the effect of the works on Hall users, no new bookings will be taken until the works are completed.

Hall users and those using the car park and Brown Hill Recreation Reserve should note the following:

Stage One – Creating a new entrance and toilets on the east (Brown Hill Hotel side) of the building.

The rear section of the car park (from the main hall side-entrance towards the north - Yarrowee River/Brown Hill Oval side) and the storage room closest to the kitchen, will be off-limits.

Stage Two – Removing the existing toilets. The existing toilets and front entrance will be off-limits. Please note that the

new entrance and toilets will already be complete.

Hall users are expected to obey any signage and not block access to the work-site. Those using the hall should be mindful that there will be noise and the normal inconvenience that comes with building works (i.e., dust, etc.).

Brown Hill Market

Brown Hill Playgroup at Caledonian Primary School

Developing a best-practice framework for playgroups-in-schools

Each week, the sounds of pattering feet, the joy of laughter and babbling of children can be heard filtering through the doors of Caledonian Primary School's multi-purpose hall. It is the Brown Hill Playgroup at Caledonian Primary School, a gathering of mums, dads, grandparents and their young ones, getting together to play, learn and connect.

At present, in conjunction with the Australian Catholic University, Deakin University, Monash University, University of Oxford and Playgroup Victoria, Brown Hill Playgroup families are involved in a research project. The project focuses on developing a best-practice framework for playgroups-in-schools.

Families have undertaken face-toface and telephone interviews, answering questions about playgroup and the home environments of their children. A six-hour workshop was held at the Australian Catholic University in Ballarat. This was attended by several playgroup parents and staff from local primary schools to help inform researchers developing the framework.

Brown Hill Playgroup at Caledonian Primary School is using this opportunity to ensure our playgroup has best practices in place to be a welcoming, safe



and inclusive group which connects families from and living close to the Brown Hill area.

Through participating in this research project, the connection between Brown Hill Playgroup and Caledonian Primary School has been formalised and enriched. In the future, this will correlate with more shared experiences between the Caledonian Primary School community and families at Brown Hill Playgroup. Ideas which have arisen include Caledonian Primary School staff and students interacting with playgroup families for story-times, tours of the school vegetable garden, Science-Week activities and performances in the school concert.

At bush kinder the children play with sticks, jump in puddles, climb trees, scramble around logs, dig in the mud and all the things that risk-averse parents usually say no to.

And research says it's doing their mental health, physical health and education the world of good, in addition to building the next generation of nature lovers and the environmentalists of the future. Ballarat's Brown Hill Kindergarten pioneered bush kinder under its educational leader Christine Sullivan, and every week the kinder pupils spend one of their four-hour sessions in a large tract of bushland along the Yarrowee River a short walk from their centre.'

Caledonian Primary School is currently preparing an application for the 'Pick my Project' grant program. We are putting in an application with a science focus around community engagement with the garden. This grant will be voted for through social media. We hope many local community members will support our grant application!

We have some fantastic community events coming up in Term Three and Term Four. The school will be hosting a Trivia Night as our major fundraiser for the year on Friday 17 August and an Arts Evening on Friday 30 November. We hope you will be able to join us!

Lego Robotics

Caledonian students from grades five and six are participating in the extra-curricular activity - Lego Robotics. In the 'Robocup Competition', there are three different options in which to compete, 'Soccer', 'Dance' and 'Rescue'. Students can choose from one of the two robots, named 'Ev3' and 'Nxt'. This year, students doing robotics are competing in 'Rescue' at the Ballarat Robocup event. However, in the state championships, held in Melbourne, students will get the choice between 'Rescue' and 'Soccer'.

In 'Rescue', the rules are quite simple. Students have to program their robot to follow a black line until you reach the 'oil spill' and save the 'victim', which is actually a metal can. In 'Soccer' though, the rules aren't quite so simple. The robot has to be programmed perfectly to keep turning until it senses the special ball. Then it must go forward and try to score a goal.

The third section of the competition is 'Dance'. The programming part is usually simple, but that depends on how students program their robot to dance. When they finish programming, students have to make their own dance routine so they can dance beside their robot. Students can make a costume for their robot as well.

When students go to the State Championships, they are going to compete against people from all over Victoria. If students win the competition, they are invited to the National Championships, held in Sydney. At this level, students compete against everyone that has won their state championships.

The winners of the National Championships are invited to the International Championships, which could be anywhere in the world. Last year they were held in Tokyo. Participants compete against EVERYONE from different countries who have won both the State and National Championships.



Holocaust survivor – Abe Goldberg

Ed: Please note that some content in this article may be upsetting for some readers.

A local secondary school student shares her recent work.

For Humanities, my class had to do a research project on World War Two. I chose to speak to a man who had survived the Holocaust. With a lot of back and forth messaging and emails I finally got the privilege of speaking with this iconic figure. While it was only a phone call, it was still a very moving and inspirational conversation.

Abe Goldberg, a 14 year-old boy growing up in the heart of Poland in 1933, got tangled up in one of the most significant events in history: the Holocaust. Coming from a very political family, Abe knew what was going on since he was nine years old. He was a junior champion gymnast and a junior champion table-tennis player.

When Abe was 15 years old, he and his extended family (roughly 40 people) were taken to Warsaw, the first, and biggest, ghetto in Germany. Whilst in the ghetto, Abe and his mum hid for four weeks in a barn. At the time, his mother was 53 and was getting too physically weak to keep having to climb up the ladder. She offered to go and surrender herself, but Abe wouldn't let her. She told him to keep hiding and keep himself safe and she would find help. However, he wouldn't let her leave and he did everything to help her, including helping her up into the loft they were hiding in.

Abe was placed in Auschwitz with his mother in 1940, along with the rest of his extended family. Before Abe and his mother got separated, she said to him, "Do what you can to stay alive, you do what you can to keep yourself safe." Then they were separated and Abe never saw her again. Out of his extended family, Abe and his older sister were the only ones to have survived the whole thing.

When Abe was in Auschwitz, he met his wife Cesia. At first, he didn't even take any notice of her as she was four years younger than him. Towards the end of his time there, when Cesia was 16, they noticed each other. They got married in 1947. On 15 June 2018, they would have been married 71 years.

Abe says, "Coming from a political background, we established underground networks when I was just a young boy, whilst working in a metal factory in the ghetto." Abe finished his metal and engineering degree and he was made a foreman in the factory.

Whilst speaking to Abe, he mentioned that there was never much food. There were 200,000 people in this particular ghetto and 25% of these people didn't survive due to hunger starvation. Abe said his aim was to survive in such conditions. He said, "All of us were hungry, but the rule was food was given to the children and we would scavenge around and scrape up what food we could."

I found that speaking to such a significant person really opened up my eyes to how cruel the world can be. I'm so thankful to have been able to speak with Abe and learn and understand what living during World War Two was really like and how lucky we are as a country to have not gone through such a life-changing event.

Give your waste a second chance

Brown Hill couple, Althea and Robert, have joined 'ShareWaste'. The project is about connecting people who wish to recycle their kitchen scraps with their neighbours who are already composting, worm-farming or keeping chickens. The idea is that people can divert organic waste from landfill while getting to know their community.

Althea and Robert, who live a short drive off Springs Road, near Coorabin Estate, will happily accept food scraps and clean gardening waste (no ivy, oxalis or other noxious weeds please). Althea says, "We've always gardened, composted and recycled as much as we can. We don't like to see anything go to waste ... or to see valuable compostables wasted in landfill. We have huge compost heaps, a small flock of chooks and a worm farm. Nothing is wasted at our place and other clean waste is always welcome and appreciated."

If you are interested in donating your organic waste, register with ShareWaste online and send a message to Althea and Robert.

Register your compost, worms or chooks

If you want to start accepting organic waste from your neighbours, sign up on the ShareWaste website. There's a map everyone can see. Once you register your address, the ShareWaste team will put a marker on the map and people from your neighbourhood can send you a message when they're ready to bring their organic waste. You can have a chat with them and tell them when they can come. What a great idea!

Compostable packaging

Brown Hill local, Ellen Burns, runs snack-food enterprise 'We Bar None' from her home. Ellen is bringing the war-on-waste into her business.

Being an eco-warrior and a smallbusiness owner didn't seem to match up, as Ellen found herself creating a lot of plastic waste, mainly in the form of her packaging. Luckily, through a lot of research, she found 'PA Packaging', a supplier in NSW that offers plant-based packaging which breaks down safely in home-compost heaps, when buried, or in the unfortunate event that it ends up in a waterway.

A successful online crowdfunding campaign recently enabled Ellen to raise support for her move to home-compostable packaging and she will be making the switch in July. She says, "I am just one of many Ballarat business-owners changing how we do things to align with our personal ethics and distaste for waste!"

Ellen is also a committee member of The Hidden Orchard (see Edition 11), which harvests unwanted fruit and redistributes it to the community to prevent food-waste and improve local food security.

Ellen doesn't want to see any of her new wrappers entering the waste stream so is encouraging people to use ShareWaste if they don't have a compost bin of their own.


